

### SHELTER FOR TEMPORARILY DISPLACED PEOPLE

In January, our partners — the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** foundation — evacuated 295 people from the Donetsk region, and by the end of the month, they had also received requests from the Dnipropetrovsk region. In a large shelter for temporarily displaced people, 82 individuals are currently living, including 14 children. Throughout the month, 16 transit residents also passed through the shelter.

January in both shelters began with a New Year's celebration for the children: they received gifts and spent time at an entertainment center. Additionally, two children were born among the shelter residents. First, in the shelter for mothers and children, a boy named Bohdan welcomed a baby sister. Their family has since moved to a new home. Later, another baby was born to a family that has been living in the large shelter for a long time. We regularly assist the shelters with rent and utility payments, as well as humanitarian aid for the residents — providing food, medicine, and essential supplies.

This month, we also sent funds to **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** to cover the transportation and burial costs for the husband of one of the shelter residents. The woman and her two children had been evacuated from Myrnohrad, while her husband had temporarily stayed behind. Unfortunately, he was killed in a shelling attack. We helped transport his body to Dobropillia and arrange the funeral.

### TRANSIT SHELTER FOR MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN

In January, 80 people passed through the children's shelter, including 42 children.

The photo shows Yulia with her children, 12-year-old Dasha and 9-year-old Yehor. They also have their grandmother, Valentyna. The family has endured five evacuations. In the winter of 2025, they were evacuated from their hometown of Lyman, which was under constant drone attacks. Now, they are living in a shelter for mothers and children. Both of Yulia's children have disabilities — her daughter Dasha was born with a congenital heart defect, and her grandmother Valentyna has diabetes. They fear that after registering at their new location, they will once again lose their disability benefits, but returning to Lyman is not an option. Their home was badly damaged by an explosion, and the few remaining belongings were burned. Yulia says there is nothing left there.

"This is the most precious thing I have left—my children and my mother," Yulia says.

Thanks to the support of **LET'S HELP**, the residents of these shelters will be able to spend another month in safety and warmth.

### SHELTERS IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK




REGION SHELTER FOR TEMPORARILY DISPLACED PEOPLE

In the shelter of our partners, the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation, in the Dnipropetrovsk region, about 80 people reside permanently. Additionally, more than 20 people have passed through it transitively this month.

In January, with the help of **LET'S HELP**, our partners were able to purchase pillows, clothing, shoes, and thermal underwear for the shelter residents and even take them to the store to try on the items. This made people feel cared for. The shelter also regularly holds art therapy sessions and medical consultations. Furthermore, the team acquired a new refrigerator, purchased anti-decubitus mattresses for residents with limited mobility, and conducted activities in the children's club.

In the photo is Anatolil from Bakhmut. In the summer of 2022, he was evacuated to Sloviansk with a leg injury and without any belongings, and a few months later, he ended up in our partners' shelter, where he still lives. Now he can only rely on the help of the center's volunteers and our support, as he has no home left.

## SHELTERS IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION FAMILY-TYPE SHELTER

In January, our partner team from the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation reached out to us for support for another family-type shelter. The house where its residents lived was sold, and the team of volunteers who helped them disbanded. As a result, 14 mothers and 23 children were left on the street without any assistance. Among them are women with disabilities and children with developmental challenges. Thanks to your donations, **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** was able to rent a new house for them, as well as create a stock of food, hygiene products, and medicines.

In the photo is Yuliya from Kostiantynivka. When the war began, she was pregnant with her second child. After giving birth, Yuliya went to the Poltava region to stay with relatives. This family was drinking, not working anywhere, and soon began to take away the displaced persons' and children's benefits from her. Yuliya left for the shelter and is now living there, while volunteers are trying to help her enroll her children in kindergarten and find a job.

### SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY

€4,200

Our partners provide safe evacuation from frontline areas for those in vulnerable situations, including bedridden patients and individuals with limited mobility. After evacuation, they are placed in a specially equipped shelter. Currently, there are 10 individuals with limited mobility living there. Among them are elderly people, some showing signs of age-related dementia. They often cannot care for themselves independently and require constant assistance with daily activities.

In the shelter, these individuals receive basic care, including help with hygiene procedures, feeding, and mobility. Additionally, they receive regular medical support. Psychologists also work with the shelter residents to reduce the stress levels caused by moving to an unknown place and the anxieties related to their situation.

Many people agree to evacuation only on the condition that their pets are also taken with them. For this reason, the shelter has equipped special enclosures to ensure that the animals are safe and do not have to be separated from their owners. Thanks to your donations, people in difficult situations and their pets are living in warmth and supporting each other.

# EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS 4,535

Another one of our Ukrainian partners is providing evacuation for people from dangerous zones. The organization develops evacuation routes, provides information and financial assistance so that Ukrainians living in occupied territories and frontline areas, or deported to Russia, can leave for a safe place.

In January, thanks to the help of **LET'S HELP**, the team organized the evacuation of 18 people — 8 women and 10 men. Among them were 9 individuals with limited mobility, and one person was immobilized.

Here is one evacuation story from an occupied territory — from the Zaporizhzhia region:

A year ago, a young woman contacted the organization asking for help to evacuate her elderly father. However, the man was hospitalized and in serious condition, so the woman was asked to wait for the evacuation. In January of this year, she reached out to our partners again. Her father lived alone, cut off from communication. From time to time, an acquaintance from another city would visit him to help a little. The man is blind in one eye and has difficulty moving due to leg problems. He was very eager to leave the occupation. The team organized his evacuation and found someone to accompany him throughout the journey and during the border crossing. He is now staying near Zaporizhzhia with his family.

# DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING \$5,000

In January, our long-time partners — **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** — continued to feed the residents of Kharkiv affected by the war. Over the month, they managed to prepare and distribute 22,500 hot meals, 1,800 sandwiches, and more than 50 kg of sweets.

This month, the foundation's team:

- Delivered 1,600 hot meals and 1,400 sandwiches to the evacuation headquarters in Kharkiv, where forcibly evacuated people from the frontline areas of the Kharkiv region continue to be brought.
- Conducted 6 outreach events in the city, where they distributed food to the State Emergency Service (DSNS), rescuers, and ordinary people helping to clear debris.
- Organized 2 large Christmas celebrations for 70 orphans from Bakhmut and 182 special needs children from Krasnokutsk.

Additionally, our partners continue to provide hot meals to residents of shelters for internally displaced persons and evacuated individuals with limited mobility. In January, we helped **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** purchase food supplies for a month and cover the rent for the space used to prepare meals.

## DELIVERY OF ANIMAL FEED TO UKRAINE 2,850

We support a volunteer organization from Sweden that delivers food and other supplies for animals to Ukraine. Our partners collect food, medicines, and care products for cats and dogs in Stockholm, and we help transport all of this to Ukraine.

The packages are sent to animals living in small private shelters and with local volunteers.

Thanks to your donations, in January, 2.6 tons of food were sent to animals in Vinnytsia, Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Odesa, and other regions of Ukraine.

## PURCHASE OF ANIMAL FEED FOR A SHELTER IN KHARKIV (£2,425)

Despite the endless air raid alerts, interruptions in electricity, water, and heating, the Kharkiv city shelter continues to take in homeless and abandoned pets. They arrive at the shelter from the streets of the city and from numerous people evacuated from war zones. Volunteers and police continue to evacuate people from the Kupiansk and Vovchansk directions.

In January, the shelter took in 218 dogs and cats. Veterinarians performed surgeries on 163 animals, and 133 pets found new families or were taken under the care of public organizations. Currently, the shelter houses 372 dogs and 93 cats.

In the photo is a cat named Vasya. He arrived at the shelter from Kupiansk with three feline brothers for temporary care after evacuation, but unfortunately, their owner was unable to take them home. Vasya was lucky: he stayed at the shelter for only a short time. He caught the eye of a new owner, who happily took him home.

Thanks to the support of **LET'S HELP**, the shelter was able to feed all the animals in January by purchasing 1,100 kg of quality food. This was enough to keep 122 dogs fed for a month.



# FEED, MEDICATIONS, AND TREATMENT FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS (13,825)

The organization **ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA** evacuates animals from combat zones, treats rescued animals, and finds them new homes. Currently, the shelter houses 136 cats and 33 dogs. In January, new animals were added to the permanent residents of the shelter, evacuated from Liptsy in the Kharkiv region.

Thanks to the support of **LET'S HELP**, the team was able to:

- Purchase food, medications (antibiotics, FIP treatments), and supplies.
- Cover the treatment and care of sick animals in the clinic (tooth extractions, treatment for panleukopenia and diabetes, diagnostic procedures).

In the photo is a cat named Kokos. He was brought to the shelter at the beginning of winter. He was in very poor condition and severely emaciated. The volunteers nursed him back to health, but in January, Kokos fell ill. He was diagnosed with feline immunodeficiency virus, dental issues, and a severe cough. Thanks to the support of **LET'S HELP**, Kokos underwent surgery to remove his diseased teeth and was prescribed supportive therapy. He is now feeling better and recovering.


### FUNDRAISER FOR MINIBUS FOR DMYTRO

Since 2022, Dmytro Eliseenko has been helping in his native Mykolaiv region — delivering humanitarian aid to de-occupied villages, feeding animals, and assisting in the restoration of housing. In 2023, he stepped on a mine while helping relatives during the planting season. Despite this, Dmytro continues his volunteer work. He is currently responsible for 13 villages — areas that are hardly reached by anyone. To deliver humanitarian aid and transport elderly people to the hospital, Dmytro needs a minibus.

This month, we were able to conclude the fundraising campaign and transfer the remaining collected funds to Dmytro so that he can continue his work with a new, safe minibus.

### DARIA'S FAMILY FROM KRYVYI RIH (£2,368)

Daria is 27 years old and lives in Kryvyi Rih, where she, along with her stepfather lhor, is caring for her two brothers and sister. In 2022, the children lost their mother: she fell seriously ill in occupied Kherson, and they were unable to save her. On January 17 of this year, a Russian missile killed their second mother — lhor's new wife, Oksana — in Kryvyi Rih, where the family had moved from Kherson.

We have already sent Daria, Ihor, and the children part of the collected funds for renting an apartment (the house they lived in was heavily damaged due to shelling), relocating to another, safer city, and purchasing items to help them start rebuilding their lives. The fundraising campaign is ongoing.

## OLHA FROM POLAND €481.33

Olha had to leave Kharkiv in 2022. She moved to Poland with her mother, two children, and two dogs. The family is still living there now. Unfortunately, after some time, Olha's mother was diagnosed with cancer. Currently, Olha cannot work much because her mother requires constant care. Their savings and income from side jobs are no longer enough to cover living expenses — the costs of housing, heating, and medications have become overwhelming for the family.

We helped the family with their rent payment.

Olha lives in the city of Izium in the Kharkiv region, which regularly suffers from shelling. From one of the recent strikes in January 2025, two windows in Olha's apartment were damaged and needed to be repaired.
