

EMERGENCY AID IN DNIPRO

€4,000

In January, Russia launched massive attacks on Dnipro. Our partners worked at the sites of the two most devastating strikes. The team deployed to these locations immediately following official announcements from the Regional Military Administration.

The project team boarded up shattered windows and doors in apartments with OSB panels and protective film, cleared out damaged belongings, and distributed hot tea, food, and blankets. They also assessed individual needs, provided emotional support, and advised people on their next steps. For families with children, the team arranged temporary accommodation in shelters. In total, 270 people received assistance.

Additionally, during the prolonged power outages in Dnipro, our partners set up a "Point of Invincibility" — a place where people could warm up, charge their phones and power banks, drink hot tea or hot chocolate, and simply catch their breath.

Thanks to the team's professionalism and your recurring donations, we were able to respond quickly to emergencies in the very first hours, help the victims, and create infrastructure that provides a lifeline in the hardest of times.


SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY €4,000

64-year-old Tamara Volodymyrivna has a disability and had lived and worked in a village in the Kharkiv region her entire life. At the start of the full-scale invasion, her village fell under occupation. However, since Russian troops entered and withdrew without active combat, the war did not seem as threatening at the time. Even then, however, she was already dealing with serious health issues.

Tamara Volodymyrivna's elderly mother lived in a neighboring village. In 2024, shelling caused an entire street there to catch fire, and her mother tragically died in her own home. In the summer of 2025, the situation in Tamara Volodymyrivna's village deteriorated drastically: the electricity, water, and gas supplies were cut off. Soon after, shops, pharmacies, and medical facilities shut down. Unable to stay in such conditions, she made the decision to evacuate. That is how she ended up at the shelter.

Our partners' shelter takes in evacuees from dangerous areas who require special care and attention due to injuries or other health issues. Here, they receive medical and psychological support and are guided through the next steps of their journey. Thanks to your donations, around 10 people receive this vital assistance every month.



DELIVERY OF PET FOOD TO UKRAINE

€2,000

Thanks to donations to **LET'S HELP**, humanitarian aid has reached a volunteer named Vitalii in Kramatorsk. He has 21 dogs and 29 cats under his care. Among them are elderly and injured animals rescued from shelling. Despite the constant threat of strikes and the proximity to the frontline, Vitalii continues to care for them.

The pet food is collected by a volunteer initiative in Stockholm, while we organize its delivery to Ukraine. In total, this January, together we delivered 2,000 kg of pet food to the Kharkiv, Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Odesa, and other regions of Ukraine.

SUPPORT FOR A STABLE DAMAGED BY SHELLING €1,200

In the summer of 2025, a Russian strike hit Yulia's home stable in Odesa. At the time of the strike, five horses and four ponies were in the stalls. One mare was killed, and another was injured.

The resulting fire destroyed all the hay and grain reserves, which were meant to last for several months. The stable was left without the most essential thing — food for the horses.

We helped Yulia purchase hay and feed so that the horses and ponies would not go hungry and could survive the cold.

AID FOR AN IDP SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

€5,000

The photo shows Iryna and Serhii reuniting. They are originally from Pokrovsk and Kostiantynivka, and they met at a hospital in Ternivka in the Dnipropetrovsk region, where they were being treated at the same time. Iryna has shrapnel wounds in her back, a spinal injury, a severe concussion, and hearing issues. Serhii has a severe leg injury. They became friends during their hospital stay and were so thrilled to see each other again at the shelter that volunteers assumed they were relatives. Besides them, around 110 people live in our partners' shelter. Another 20 people stay here temporarily each month. In January, your donations helped the team to:



- care for sick residents, provide them with medications, and arrange temporary hospitalization if necessary;
- organize visits from physiotherapists for individuals using crutches and walking canes;
- conduct group sessions with a psychologist;
- replace old and broken door handles, faucets, and showerheads, and purchase additional wardrobes for personal belongings;
- build an additional wheelchair ramp and install anti-slip strips on the entrance steps of the building;
- purchase groceries, hygiene products, first aid kits, and fire extinguishers.

People keep arriving. We've placed them in the last available spots (the top bunks); otherwise, everything is completely full. The shelter is at maximum capacity. Thanks to your support, we remain a place of warmth, comfort, care, and assistance. People feel safe here and are receiving help.

DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING €8,000

January was a very difficult month for Ukraine, and for Kharkiv in particular. During the month, the city suffered 43 missile strikes. Our long-term partners, the Kharkiv-based foundation **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM**, deployed to 17 of these impact sites. In total, over the course of the month, they prepared:

- 5,000 hot meals, 15,000 sandwiches, drinks, and sweets for evacuees in Kharkiv;
- 1,700 hot meals for a shelter housing evacuated people with limited mobility;
- 12,000 hot meals, 20,000 sandwiches, and drinks for victims, rescuers, and volunteers at the strike sites;
- 200 hot meals and 400 sandwiches for victims, rescuers, and volunteers at the strike site in the Zolochiv hromada of the Kharkiv region;
- 250 hot meals and 250 gifts for children evacuated from the Donetsk region.

Additionally, on January 8, after shelling left Dnipro without electricity and heating, **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** distributed water, power banks, and flashlights to the city's residents.

The following day, they provided food and hot drinks for the victims and volunteers.

Together, we helped the foundation purchase groceries and disposable tableware for the month, pay the rent for their cooking facility, and cover the additional costs of helping the residents of Dnipro.

EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS

€3,800

Svitlana (name changed) had recently been living alone in the Kherson region, with no relatives or loved ones left nearby. Her daughter reached out to our partners for help to bring her mother to live with her in Kyiv.

The woman moved around the house using a walking cane and could not go outside on her own. The journey required a wheelchair and someone to accompany her and help her cross the border. Our partners provided her with everything she needed, and Svitlana is now safely reunited with her daughter in Kyiv.


Thanks to your donations, in January our partners were able to evacuate nine more people, in addition to Svitlana, from occupied or frontline territories to safety. They specifically work with those who find it especially difficult to evacuate on their own: people with limited mobility and other physical or mental disabilities.

SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR IDPs AND **€2,000** MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN IN KAMIANSKE

The photo shows Alina with her son, Rodion. She is 42 years old, and the boy is 13. A year and a half ago, they left Synelnykove in the Dnipropetrovsk region and have since been living in our partners' shelter in the city of Kamianske. The family's home in Synelnykove was damaged by shelling, and its windows were blown out. But the main reason for their departure was Rodion's severe anxiety; he had become terrified of any loud noises resembling explosions or missiles flying overhead. Alina and her son plan to move abroad, but in the meantime, she volunteers at the shelter and is saving money for their relocation.

Our partners' shelter in Kamianske takes in those who have nowhere else to go: people who have lost their homes due to the war, including mothers with children. Around 40 people live here permanently. A number of others find temporary refuge here every month.

Unfortunately, while the shelter can provide its residents with care and support, it cannot provide food: there simply aren't enough funds for it. With your help, we purchased groceries for them for an entire month. We also covered the repair costs for an evacuation vehicle. Thanks to a functioning vehicle, volunteers can evacuate people from frontline areas, as well as meet and pick up those evacuated to Dnipro by other organizations. This helps around 30 people every month.

SURGICAL SUPPLIES, MEDICATIONS, AND PET FOOD FOR A SHELTER IN KHARKIV €3,110

The dog in the photo was found in freezing cold weather on the Chuhuiv highway. She was sitting right in a snowbank — freezing, soaking wet, and suffering from hypothermia. She is an elderly dog, about 15 years old. Most likely, she had simply been abandoned on the street. Caring people brought her to the **KHARKIV CITY PET SHELTER**, where she was warmed up, bathed, brushed, and given medical treatment. During her rescue, this quiet and gentle senior dog won the hearts of the shelter's veterinarians so much that they affectionately named her Zhanna Vasylivna. Now, she is looking for a loving family who will give her a real home for her senior years.

In January, the **KHARKIV CITY PET SHELTER** took in 107 animals (67 dogs and 40 cats). Veterinarians spayed and neutered 121 animals, while 83 dogs and cats found new homes or were transferred to the care of NGOs. The shelter currently cares for 472 animals. Together, we helped the team purchase surgical supplies, veterinary medications, sutures, and dog food.

FOOD, CAT LITTER, AND RENT FOR A SHELTER FOR EVACUATED PETS €3,385

The cat in the photo is named Kleopatra. She is a Maine Coon, though unfortunately, her breed hasn't helped her find a loving family yet. Klepa arrived at our partners' shelter in January, having already been passed from home to home three times. Her last owners surrendered her because they couldn't manage the cat while also caring for a child with ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorder).



During her first few days at the shelter, she was terrified, refused to eat, and hid in dark corners. Our partners consulted with breeders familiar with Maine Coons. Thanks to their advice, the team managed to build trust with Klepa and even help her make friends with other animals. The shelter is currently working on her behavior correction and health recovery, while actively looking for a new home for her. In total, the shelter is home to 136 cats and 13 dogs. With our support this month, the team was able to:

- purchase pet food, cat litter, and cleaning supplies;
- pay the facility's rent, utility bills, and the salary of one staff member;
- purchase medications and cover veterinary treatment costs.


IRYNA'S FAMILY FROM THE KHARKIV REGION

€404.55

Iryna is a single mother from Kharkiv who currently lives in a village in the Kharkiv region with her two children. Her eldest son, Hlib, is studying at a college in Berestyn, while her youngest daughter, Toma, studies remotely at a gymnasium in Kharkiv.

Before the war, the family lived in their own apartment in Pivnichna Saltivka. However, at the start of the full-scale invasion, this Kharkiv neighborhood was among the first to come under heavy fire. On March 4, 2022, a shell hit their building, prompting Iryna to make the difficult decision to flee with her children.

By profession, Iryna is a seamstress, but she hasn't been able to find work since the war began because the village is very small and there are simply no jobs available. They survive on IDP (Internally Displaced Person) assistance of €160 a month, while locals and the village council have helped them with clothes and household items. We sent the family money to stock up on groceries (such as grains, flour, and cooking oil) and purchase essential household goods.

TETIANA FROM KAMIANSKE €506

Tetiana is a displaced person from Pokrovsk in the Donetsk region, who has been living in Kamianske in the Dnipropetrovsk region since August 2024. At 66 years old, the pensioner and widow lives alone. Tetiana has a daughter, but she is unable to take her mother in: like Tetiana, she evacuated from Pokrovsk with her own family and now rents a single-room apartment for the three of them.

Tetiana does not have enough money to cover her rent and basic necessities, such as warm clothes, groceries, medications, and a space heater. We sent her funds to help her feel a little more secure during these difficult times.

DIANA'S FAMILY FROM DNIPRO €1,000

Diana and her husband, Oleksandr, are displaced people from the Donetsk region. Until January 2025, they lived in the village of Hryshyne in the Pokrovsk district, but the approaching frontline forced them to flee to Dnipro. That same year, they welcomed their son, Mark, who is now six months old. The baby was diagnosed with congenital cataracts in both eyes and requires two surgeries, but the family cannot even afford their basic needs.

Before going on maternity leave, Diana worked as a school teacher for nine years, while her husband works at an auto repair shop. We sent them funds to cover their basic necessities — such as rent and essential baby supplies — so they can focus entirely on their son's health.

VERONIKA FROM KYIV €2,000

On the night of July 31, 2025, Russian forces attacked Kyiv with missiles and drones. Thirty-two people were killed in the strike, including Veronika's parents. Her cat also perished. The 23-year-old miraculously survived the attack: she was blown out of her ninth-floor apartment window along with her bed, sustaining a leg broken in two places and a damaged tooth. She spent a month recovering in the hospital.

We stayed in touch with Veronika throughout this entire time, waiting for the necessary paperwork to be finalized so we could send assistance. In January, we sent her funds to help set up another apartment so she could move in. The place required light renovations and essential furniture to make it livable.

Your help and your work are incredibly valuable to me and to the people who have suffered from this ugly war.



OLENA FROM THE ZAPORIZHZHIA REGION

€2,000

In 2022–2023, Olena, a resident of Kamianka-Dniprovska in the Zaporizhzhia region, spent six months in Russian captivity. She was tortured, raped, and used as a slave, leaving her with a Group II disability.

Olena has since returned home and is now trying to at least partially recover. Unfortunately, she cannot afford further rehabilitation. She lacks the funds to cover even basic needs like rent, groceries, and clothing for her family.

We sent Olena funds to help continue her rehabilitation and purchase essential items as she rebuilds her life after surviving captivity.

I am incredibly grateful to you for such significant help.
