SUPPORT FOR TWO SHELTERS IN DNIPRO 7,000

In February, our partners, the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** foundation, evacuated 102 people from the Donetsk region. The pace of evacuation has slightly decreased, but there are still requests from the Dnipropetrovsk region. Among those evacuated were 12 children and 12 people with disabilities.

In the main CNG shelter, 82 people are living permanently. In February, 20 people stayed there temporarily. In the children's shelter, 40 mothers and children found temporary refuge.

We support the shelters by covering rent and utility expenses, as well as providing residents with humanitarian aid: food, medicine, and essential items.

In the photo is Nelia Stepanovna, a resident of the shelter from Mariupol. Here is what she says about her evacuation: "I wanted to leave from the very beginning, but there was no opportunity. The city was under occupation, and many acquaintances who tried to leave ended up returning. We left only after four months, when the fighting in the city ended. Only then could we leave. My parents stayed there; they are already elderly. My loved one stayed there too because he has a bedridden mother."







SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR IDPs IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

In the shelter run by our partners, the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation in the Dnipropetrovsk region, about 80 people reside permanently. Additionally, around 20 people stay there temporarily each month. In February, with the help of **LET'S HELP**, our partners were able to:

- Purchase a necessary supply of hygiene products and medicines;
- Assist two shelter residents in obtaining passports;
- Accommodate about 10 evacuated individuals with injuries requiring additional care;
- Install a new stove in the shelter;
- Conduct a creative workshop and organize haircuts for residents with limited mobility.

Unfortunately, this month, one of the elderly residents of the shelter passed away. Valentyna Ivanovna had lived her entire life in the city of Toretsk in the Donetsk region. In July 2024, she and her family decided to move to relatives in Odesa, but they lost contact with them when the family was already in Dnipro. Valentyna and her family were forced to sleep at the train station until they found the number of volunteers who took them to the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** shelter. In early March, there was a flu outbreak in the shelter. Unfortunately, she could not survive it or return home. Volunteers buried her in the city of Pidhorodne.





SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY (£5,012)

Our partners provide safe evacuation from frontline areas for those in vulnerable situations, including bedridden patients and people with limited mobility. After evacuation, they are accommodated in a specially equipped shelter. Currently, 10 people with limited mobility reside there. Among them are the elderly, some of whom show signs of age-related dementia. They often cannot care for themselves independently and require constant assistance with daily activities.

In the shelter, these individuals receive basic care, including help with hygiene procedures, feeding, and mobility. Additionally, they receive regular medical support. Psychologists also work with the shelter residents to reduce stress levels caused by relocation to an unfamiliar place and the anxiety due to the current situation.

Many people agree to evacuate only if their pets can come with them. For this reason, the shelter has equipped special enclosures to ensure the animals are safe and can stay with their owners. Thanks to your donations, people in difficult situations and their animals live in warmth and support each other.



EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS (3,535)

Another of our Ukrainian partners develops evacuation routes, provides information and financial assistance to help Ukrainians living in occupied territories, frontline zones, or those deported to Russia, to reach a safe place. In January, with the help of **LET'S HELP**, the team organized the evacuation of 12 people. Among them were 8 women (4 aged 60–80, 4 over 80) and 4 men (2 aged 0–18, 2 aged 60–80). Additionally, our partners evacuated 9 people with limited mobility.

Here is one evacuation story from an occupied territory — from Melitopol:

A 73-year-old woman lived alone. She was seriously ill, suffering from cancer and diabetes, which required her to have a constant supply of insulin. In recent months, her condition worsened because she had no access to examinations or treatment under occupation. Due to her deteriorating health, she began experiencing memory problems. She became confused and disoriented, making her afraid to stay home alone, yet traveling by herself was also impossible.

Our partners managed to pick her up and include her in a group evacuation. It was challenging, and the stress of the journey worsened her condition, but ultimately she crossed the border and reunited with her daughter in Ukraine.



EVACUATION OF PEOPLE FROM OCCUPIED TERRITORIES (\$1,000)

In February, we began collaborating with a new organization that also focuses on evacuating civilians from occupied territories. The primary goal of our partners is to ensure the safe relocation of people to areas controlled by Ukraine or to EU countries.

Your donations help cover the costs of transportation, logistics, organizing the entire evacuation process, and providing necessary support to the people involved.



EVACUATION OF PEOPLE FROM FRONTLINE AREAS \$\(\pm\)3,500

Another new partner of **LET'S HELP** is a public organization from Kherson, whose volunteers have been evacuating civilians since January 2023. The team evacuates people from frontline areas in the Kherson, Zaporizhzhia, and Dnipropetrovsk regions. Most evacuation requests currently come from the Kherson direction.

We assisted the organization in repairing one of their evacuation vehicles and in purchasing fuel and spare tires for two cars.



DELIVERY OF GENERATORS TO FRONTLINE VILLAGES 4,000

In February, our partners, the organization **KORIDOR UA**, which assists the civilian population, received several urgent requests for the supply of generators to villages in the Kherson region near the frontline. The destruction of infrastructure and constant power outages create difficulties for local residents and hinder the operation of social and educational institutions.

Thanks to your donations, the team purchased 4 generators and delivered them to "invincibility points" in the villages of the Kherson region. Now, people have a place where they can warm up, charge their phones, call loved ones, make tea, and even stay overnight if the shelling is particularly intense. Another generator was given to a rural gymnasium so that children can study in warmth.



DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING \$\(\psi_5,000\)

In February, our long-standing partners, the **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** foundation, continued to feed the residents of Kharkiv affected by the war. Over the month, they prepared and distributed:

Hello, Anna! There were 4 incidents overnight. We didn't sleep, but we managed to feed and warm everyone. We provided food, tea, coffee, and sandwiches. Thank you very much for your help

- 2,500 hot meals, 5,000 sandwiches, and sweets for people in evacuation centers;
- 3,000 hot meals for people with limited mobility living in a shelter for internally displaced persons;
- 5,000 hot meals for a children's development center and for orphans.

Additionally, our partners responded to 18 incidents, where they provided food, hot drinks, and support to over 2,000 people, including civilians affected by the incidents, state emergency service workers, volunteers clearing debris, and ambulance crews.

Furthermore, in February, **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** regularly delivered hot meals through volunteers to elderly individuals living alone in the Kharkiv villages of Lyptsi and Mali Prokhody, as well as food to volunteers restoring homes damaged by incidents in the Kharkiv settlement of Zolochiv.

This month, we assisted the foundation in purchasing a month's supply of food, covering the rent for the food preparation facility, and acquiring two new tables for distributing food at incident sites.





PAYMENT ORDER

DELIVERY OF BREAD TO RESIDENTS OF FRONTLINE AREAS (1,910)

In February, with the help of the **VILNA UA** foundation, we began supporting the residents of three villages in the Kramatorsk district of the Donetsk region. These villages are home to 485 people, all of whom are nearly cut off from food supplies.

One of the villages is located 9 km from the frontline, where active fighting is ongoing. The local store burned down last summer, leaving residents without a place to buy food. The other two villages also lack stores. Mandatory evacuation from this area took place immediately after its de-occupation in 2022. Life in these villages has been consistently difficult, but not enough to force the elderly to leave their homes.

Major humanitarian organizations do not reach these areas due to safety protocols. Residents receive a humanitarian package from the government only once every few months. Our Ukrainian partners managed to find a volunteer who previously delivered bread there and is willing to do so again.

Starting this month, we began delivering fresh bread to the residents of these three villages. This is a recurring effort, as food is a constant need for 485 people.







DELIVERY OF ANIMAL FEED TO UKRAINE \$\(\pm\)3,000

We support a volunteer organization from Sweden that delivers pet food and other supplies to Ukraine. Our partners collect food, medicine, and care products for cats and dogs in Stockholm, and we help bring all of this to Ukraine.

The packages are sent to animals living in small private shelters and with local volunteers.

Thanks to your donations, in February, more than 5 tons of food were sent to animals in the Vinnytsia, Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Odesa, and other regions of Ukraine.



PURCHASE OF VETERINARY MEDICATIONS AND SURGICAL INSTRUMENTS FOR ANIMALS IN A SHELTER IN KHARKIV (2,460)

In February, the evacuation of people from the Kupiansk and Vovchansk districts in the Kharkiv region continued. Our partners, the **KHARKIV CITY SHELTER**, continued to assist homeless and abandoned pets, as well as take in animals from numerous refugees from the war zone.

In February, the shelter cared for 226 dogs and cats. Veterinarians performed surgeries on 180 animals, and 163 pets found new families or were placed under the care of public organizations. Currently, the shelter houses 376 dogs and 58 cats.

In the photo is Fedya the cat, who found a loving family. Fedya came to the shelter for temporary care after evacuation, but unfortunately, his previous owners could no longer care for him. In February, Fedya became a beloved pet in a new family.

Thanks to the support of **LET'S HELP**, the shelter was able to purchase necessary veterinary medications for treating animals, as well as surgical instruments and supplies this month.



DARIA'S FAMILY FROM KRYVYI RIH (£75



Daria is 27 years old and lives in Kryvyi Rih. Together with her stepfather Ihor, she takes care of her two brothers and sister. In 2022, the children lost their mother; she fell seriously ill in occupied Kherson and could not be saved. On January 17 of this year, a Russian missile killed their second mother, Ihor's new wife, Oksana, in Kryvyi Rih, where the family had moved from Kherson.

In February, we completed the fundraiser and sent Daria, lhor, and the children the remaining amount collected to cover the rent for an apartment (as the house they lived in was severely damaged by shelling), to relocate to another, safer city, and to purchase items to start rebuilding their lives.

We are very grateful to you. I am thankful that it happened that we met you, completely by chance



OLHA FROM POLAND **£471.57**



Olha had to leave Kharkiv in 2022. She moved to Poland with her mother, two children, and two dogs. The family still lives there. Unfortunately, after some time, Olga's mother was diagnosed with cancer. Now, Olha cannot work much because her mother requires constant care. Their savings and income from part-time jobs are no longer enough to cover living expenses — rent, heating, and medication have become unaffordable for the family.

This month, we helped the family again by covering the rent for their home.

IRYNA FROM LATVIA **£150.18**

In September, we were approached for support by Iryna from Latvia. We had already assisted her with paying for a dormitory room in the fall. Now, she is once again in a critical situation: her asthma has worsened, and due to the cold in the dormitory, Irina fell ill, which further deteriorated her overall condition. Because of all this, she is currently unable to work. We helped Iryna by covering the rent for her room for a month.
