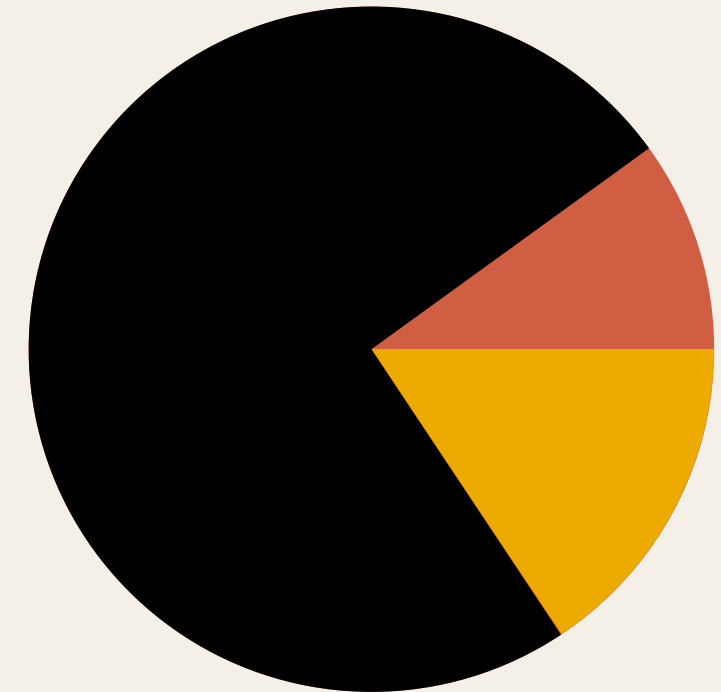

EVACUATION FROM OCCUPIED AREAS

Olena and her son, Pavlo (names changed), were living under occupation in the village of Lazurne in the Kherson region. Pavlo has an intellectual disability, for which he was officially granted disability status while already living under occupation. The family reached out to our partners for help, and thanks to them, they were able to leave the Russian-controlled territory.

The organization evacuates people from occupied territories in the Kherson, Zaporizhzhia, and other regions of Ukraine. After evacuation, they are relocated to Ukrainian-controlled areas or to the EU. In February, your donations helped rescue 6 people from occupied territories: the funds covered transportation, preparation of travel documents, the team's work, as well as food and medications for the evacuees.

DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING €6,000

Over the course of the month, the team from the Kharkiv-based foundation **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** deployed to 4 strike sites and conducted 11 food distributions for people left without electricity and heating. In total, they prepared and delivered:

- 2,100 hot meals for a shelter housing evacuated people;
- 3,000 hot meals, 7,000 sandwiches, drinks, and sweets to evacuation centers;
- 1,200 hot meals for residents with limited mobility in the frontline areas of the region;
- 1,800 hot meals, 5,000 sandwiches, sweets, and drinks for victims, rescuers, and volunteers at strike sites in Kharkiv and the surrounding region;
- 140 hot meals, 280 sandwiches, fruits, and sweets for children evacuated from the Donetsk region;
- 3,300 hot meals, hot drinks, sweets, and fruits for Kharkiv residents who were left without electricity, heating, and water due to strikes on infrastructure.

With your donations, the foundation purchased groceries and disposable tableware for the month, and also paid the rent for their cooking facility.

EMERGENCY AID IN KRYVVI RIH

€3,310

In February, we welcomed new partners — a non-governmental organization from Kryvyi Rih that helps deal with the aftermath of missile and Shahed drone attacks. The initiative includes a rapid response team of 15 to 20 people. To date, the team has deployed to around 50 strike sites.

The volunteers have undergone specialized training and can provide first aid to victims before paramedics arrive. They also board up blown-out windows and doors, clear rubble, dismantle dangerous structures, and help prepare homes for rebuilding.

Your donations allowed us to purchase tools, a portable power station, a tent, fuel, and essential supplies for the rapid response team. All of this will enable the team to respond to emergencies faster and operate in challenging conditions.

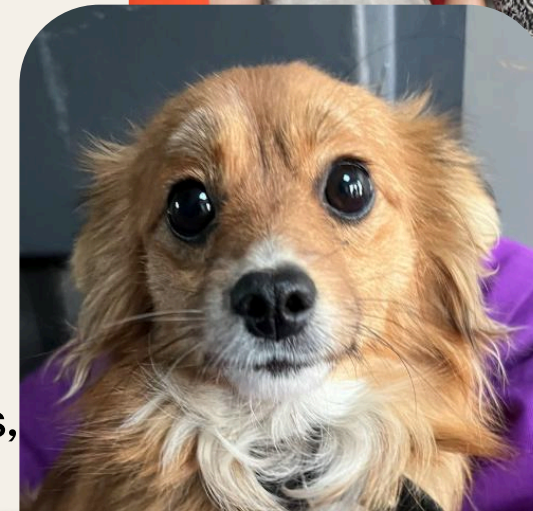

SUPPORT FOR SHELTERS IN DNIPRO €4,850

The photo shows Oleksandr, Maryna, and their three children: Kira (3.5 years old), Mykyta (8 years old), and Sasha (15 years old). They lived in the town of Shakhtarske in the Dnipropetrovsk region, which has been subjected to regular shelling in recent months. The children were terrified of the strikes and slept in the apartment's hallway almost every night because it was safer there. Eventually, the family evacuated and ended up at the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** shelter.

In February, 338 people and their pets were evacuated from the frontline areas of the Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, and Kharkiv regions. Some of them were taken in by CNG. The organization's main shelter is home to 55 permanent residents, while another 24 found temporary refuge here. The shelter for mothers and children only accommodates people on a temporary basis. In February, 71 people stayed there, including 35 children.

Your donations allow the foundation to cover house rentals and utilities, groceries, transportation for the shelter residents, as well as medications and basic necessities for them.

AID FOR A SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION €5,570

The photo shows Halyna from the town of Dobropillia in the Donetsk region. During the severe winter freezing weather, she hid from the shelling in a basement. Halyna was evacuated with frostbite on her legs, but doctors managed to avoid amputation. Halyna has no family left, all her documents are lost. After being discharged from the hospital, she ended up at the shelter run by our partners — the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation. Here, she and 130 other people are provided with care, meals, rehabilitation, and assistance in recovering their lost documents and bank cards. In February, thanks to your donations, the foundation's team was able to:

- arrange regular doctor visits to the shelter;
- organize a visit from a mobile medical unit to conduct blood tests;
- schedule surgeries for people with mine injuries;
- arrange visits from hairdressers for paralyzed individuals and people with limited mobility;
- cover psychologist sessions for three female shelter residents who are survivors of domestic violence;
- purchase groceries, hygiene products, and medications.

SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY €4,005

In February, a family from the frontline city of Kupiansk in the Kharkiv region reached out to **LET's HELP** partners. The family consisted of a couple over 85 and the 75-year-old brother of one of the spouses, who required constant care due to neurological issues. The elderly family asked for help with their evacuation and finding long-term accommodation.

The team arranged a medical examination for the brother, assisted with his paperwork, found a suitable long-term care facility for him, and arranged specialized transport to relocate him to a geriatric care center. As for the couple, with the support of the local community, the team found them a private home in a suburb with a much safer and more stable environment.

Our partners work with evacuees from dangerous areas who have special needs. The team provides them with medical and psychological support, accommodates them in their shelter, helps them find new housing, and assists them in getting back on their feet after evacuating. Thanks to your donations, 21 people received this vital support in February.

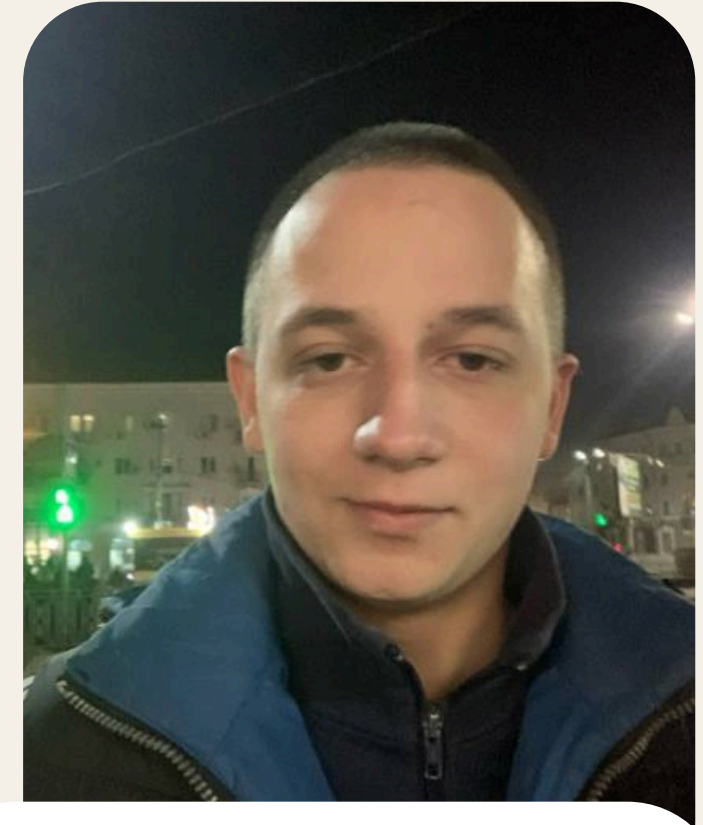
SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR IDPs AND MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN IN KAMIANSKE

Danylo is originally from the town of Ternivka in the Dnipropetrovsk region, where on February 1, a Russian drone struck a bus carrying miners. After that, the young man could no longer stay in his hometown — it was simply too terrifying. He is currently staying at our partners' shelter in the city of Kamianske, trying to figure out his next steps.

The organization takes in a wide variety of people who have lost their homes due to the war. Around 40 people live in the shelter permanently, while a few others can always find temporary refuge here. Unfortunately, the team's resources are extremely limited, and without our support, they are unable to cover even the most basic needs.

In February, we purchased enough groceries to supply the shelter for the entire upcoming month. We also covered the costs of repairing the roof and replacing an old kitchen countertop, making it much more comfortable for the residents to cook their meals.

FOOD, CAT LITTER, AND RENT FOR A SHELTER FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS €3,380

The photo shows Iryna. A Ukrainian soldier evacuated the pregnant kitty from the Kupiansk direction and gave her her name. Soon after, Iryna gave birth to four kittens. Two days after the delivery, the feline family arrived in Kharkiv to be under the care of our partners, the **ANIMAL GUARDIANS** organization. Initially, the family was sent to a veterinary clinic for medical observation, as the kittens were incredibly tiny, and providing them with proper care at the shelter would have been very difficult. Very soon, Iryna and her little ones will move to the shelter, grow stronger, and be ready to find their new families. In total, our partners' shelter is home to 137 cats and 13 dogs. Thanks to you, this month the team was able to:

- purchase pet food, cat litter, and cleaning supplies;
- pay the facility's rent, utility bills, and the salary of a staff member who monitors and cares for the animals;
- purchase medications and cover veterinary treatment costs.

SURGICAL SUPPLIES, MEDICATIONS, AND PET FOOD FOR A SHELTER IN KHARKIV

€3,075

The dog in the photo is named Druzhok. He was found by a military medic in a combat zone. The dog was severely exhausted, seriously injured, and freezing cold. The soldiers brought him to the **KHARKIV CITY PET SHELTER**. During the examination, veterinarians found that Druzhok was suffering from hypothermia, a hematoma in his groin area, and a broken tail. The dog underwent emergency surgery. Currently, Druzhok is under the care of specialists, undergoing rehabilitation, and steadily recovering. And best of all, a new home has already been found for him!

In February, the **KHARKIV CITY PET SHELTER** took in 100 dogs and 44 cats. Veterinarians spayed and neutered 118 animals, while 95 dogs and cats found new homes or were transferred to the care of NGOs. The shelter currently cares for 464 animals. Your donations provided pet food, veterinary medications, and flea and deworming drops for the dogs.

DELIVERY OF PET FOOD TO UKRAINE

€2,000

For over 10 years, Tetiana, along with other volunteers, has been rescuing, treating, spaying and neutering, and feeding stray animals in the Kharkiv region. Currently, she has over 67 cats and dogs under her care.

Thanks to your donations, volunteers like Tetiana receive everything they need to provide the animals with pet food and basic care.

The pet food is collected by a volunteer initiative in Stockholm, while we organize its delivery to Ukraine. In February, we managed to deliver 2,000 kg of pet food to the Kharkiv, Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Odesa, and other regions.

OLEKSANDR'S FAMILY FROM KRYVVI RIH

Oleksandr and his father are displaced people from the town of Popasna in the Luhansk region. In 2022, Oleksandr moved to Kryvyi Rih because the factory where he worked relocated there. Eventually, due to the full-scale war, the contracts of all employees were suspended, leaving him without a job. The family currently rents an old house and survives solely on the father's pension.

We helped Oleksandr and his father purchase kitchen essentials — plates, a frying pan, and pots — as well as a greenhouse and a sprayer, so the two men could set up a vegetable garden and grow their own food.

TETIANA AND ZAURI'S FAMILY FROM GEORGIA

We previously shared Tetiana and Zauri's story in 2023. First, war forced them to flee their home in Abkhazia in 1993, and then, in 2022, they had to leave their second home in Ukraine. Since then, the elderly couple has been living in Tbilisi, hoping to one day return to their hometown of Kherson.

In recent years, Zauri has gone nearly blind (he suffers from glaucoma) and has been battling prostate cancer. Then, in January, another tragedy struck: he suffered a fall and broke his hip. His wife, Tetiana, is now his eyes, his hands, and his sole support system, but their resources are completely depleted. We couldn't stand by without helping a family we've known for three years now. We sent them funds to cover Zauri's rehabilitation, medications, groceries, and rent.

OLHA'S FAMILY FROM KYIV €430

Before the war, Olha and her family — her husband and two children — lived in their own home in the Donetsk region. In 2015, it became too dangerous to stay there, so the family relocated to Kyiv, where they still live today. Olha's husband, Kostia, works as a mechanic at a factory, while she works part-time at a store. Their salaries are barely enough to make ends meet.

We sent the family funds to purchase clothes and shoes for the children, as well as household linens, such as towels and bedding.

In February, Karyna reached out to us for help once again. She is a student whose mother was killed following a strike on the Kyiv Institute of Cardiology on September 28, 2025. Karyna's father passed away that same year. The young woman was left alone with her dog, cat, and 84-year-old grandfather.

Karyna studies remotely and, until recently, worked as a cook. Unfortunately, she lost her job, leaving the family with practically no means of support. We sent them funds to cover their utility bills, as well as to purchase groceries, medications for her grandfather, and pet food.



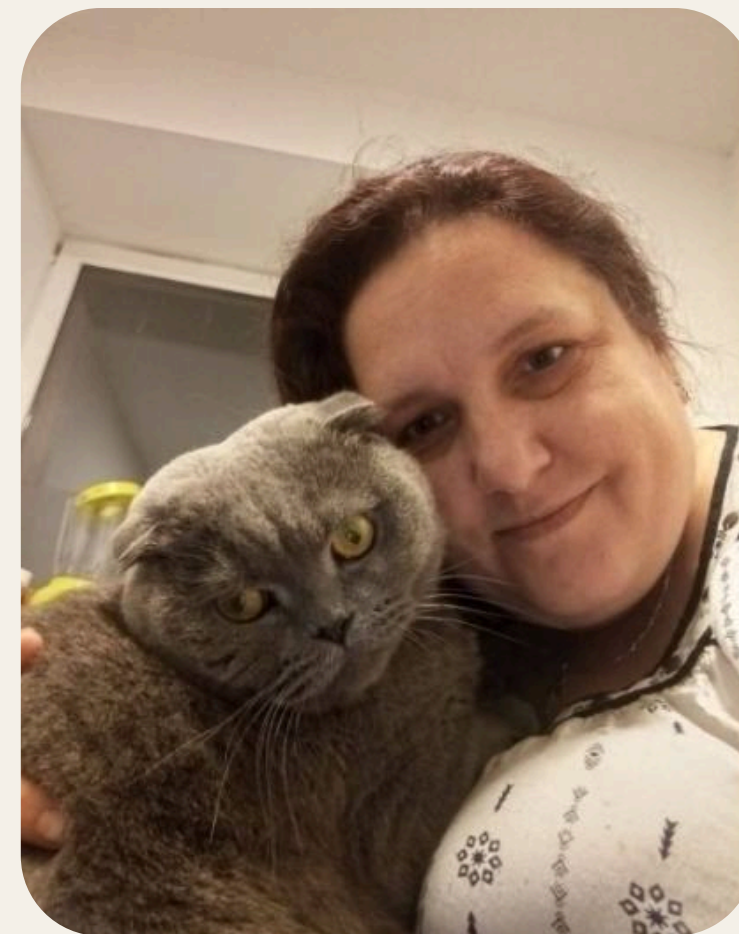

Iryna left the Dnipropetrovsk region due to the war, and, for the past few years, has been living in a dormitory room in Latvia with her cat. She also suffers from asthma. Any virus or common cold triggers a severe flare-up of her condition — which is exactly what happened in February. Because of this, Iryna is currently unable to work and earn money to pay her rent.

LET'S HELP occasionally supports Iryna, and this month we stepped in again to cover her monthly room rent and utility bills. Thanks to your donations, Iryna and her cat will not end up on the street.
