



#### SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER IN DNIPRO (16,9)



Our regular partners — the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** Foundation — have two shelters in Dnipro. The main one is home to 64 people on a permanent basis. Among them are seven children and 23 elderly people. In April, 18 more people also stayed temporarily at the shelter.

We support the shelter by covering the costs of rent and utilities. In addition, we provide its residents with humanitarian aid: food, medicine, and essential items. In April, we were able to send the foundation more money thanks to funds raised from the **Art Against War** auction. The auction was organized by a friendly initiative, which passed part of the proceeds to **LET'S HELP**.

In the photo — Oleksandra with her daughter Vitalina. They, along with Oleksandra's husband Maksym, left Novopavlivka and ended up at the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** shelter. Here is what Oleksandra says about their evacuation: "Everything was fine until the village was completely destroyed by KABs. I never thought that the war would reach us, to such a small village. We had everything: a football field was built, the stores were open, there was steady work. And now — no houses, not even a cemetery. There is nowhere to return to. After evacuation, at first I wanted to go back. But then I realized — there is nowhere to go. Many thanks to the shelter: here we were provided with everything. We lack nothing. We want to find work, rent a place to live. There is no home anymore. My daughter isn't going to school yet: after evacuation it was difficult — but soon she will start."


### SUPPORT TO AN IDP SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION



At the shelter of our partners — the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** Foundation — in the Dnipropetrovsk region, around 80 people live permanently. Another approximately 20 people find temporary refuge there each month.

In April, your donations helped the shelter team to:

- Welcome new evacuees from the Donetsk region;
- Purchase hygiene products, medicine, and food;
- Install a new balcony door and interior doors;
- Hold art therapy and sessions with a psychologist for residents;
- Celebrate Easter all together.







In the photo — Vyacheslav, 49 years old. At the end of August 2023, his house in Kupiansk, Kharkiv region, was bombed. At the moment of the strike, the man was near his house; large shrapnel pieces injured his legs. With the help of the military, Vyacheslav was evacuated to Kharkiv, where he underwent leg surgery. Later, he had another surgery in Kyiv. Now Vyacheslav lives in the shelter and needs leg prosthetics. The shelter staff are trying to assist him with this.

### SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY

Another of our partners helps evacuate people from frontline areas. Their focus is on those who are especially vulnerable — bedridden and people with limited mobility. After evacuation, people are accommodated in a specially equipped shelter, where they are cared for and provided with medical and psychological assistance.

Here is one of the stories. In April, Emilia Fedorivna (name changed) was brought to the shelter — a lonely 69-year-old woman. She lived in a village in Kharkiv region, where it had been quiet for a long time. Everything changed when tanks entered the village and Russian troops occupied the territory. The woman was left alone, hid in a cellar, endured shelling, and did not know if she would see the next day. Learning through social media about the possibility of evacuation, Emilia called the foundation of our partners. First, she was evacuated to a transit point, and then to the shelter. Here the woman finally felt safe. "Thank you to the volunteers for their help. I am alone, the journey was difficult, but I believe everything will get better," she says. Now Emilia has a chance to start a new life.

Thanks to your support, the residents of this shelter live in warmth and care.



# EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS \$\( \text{C3}, 800 \)

Other Ukrainian partners of ours develop evacuation routes, provide information and financial assistance so that Ukrainians living in occupied territories, frontline areas, or deported to Russia can relocate to a safe place. In April, thanks to the help of **LET'S HELP**, the team organized the evacuation of nine people: six women and three men. Eight of them have limited mobility, and one is completely immobile. One person is currently on the way to a safe place but has not yet reached territories controlled by the government of Ukraine.

Here is one evacuation story from the occupied territory:

Olena (name changed) is 85 years old. She lived with her husband in Donetsk region, but in April her husband passed away, and she was left completely alone. Olena is almost blind and has very poor mobility; she could not travel alone. Our partners found someone to accompany her during the evacuation and purchased everything necessary for the trip. Thanks to the help of the team, Olena reached Kovel, where her daughter met her. Then they went together to Kyiv.



#### **EVACUATION FROM OCCUPIED TERRITORIES**



In April, we supported an organization that is engaged in evacuating civilians from occupied territories. Its main task is to ensure people's safe departure to regions controlled by Ukraine or to EU countries.

Thanks to your donations, our partners managed to organize the evacuation of 15 people. Funds from **LET'S HELP** covered expenses for transportation, logistics, route coordination, as well as escorting the evacuees. Additionally, the rescued people will receive necessary assistance: food, medicine, and temporary housing.

### DELIVERY OF GENERATORS TO FRONTLINE VILLAGES

€4,855

Another organization we cooperate with is **KORIDOR UA**. It supports the civilian population of Ukraine in frontline and affected regions. In April, the team again received urgent requests for help from residents of villages in Kherson region located near the front line. People were asking for generators: with damaged infrastructure and constant power outages, these are absolutely essential.

Thanks to your support, the **KORIDOR UA** team was able to purchase and deliver five generators: two for water supply, two for resilience points, and one to a paramedic-midwife station. This facility serves 880 people. Twice a week, doctors visit here: a family doctor, a neurologist, and an endocrinologist. They regularly perform dressings, and administer intramuscular, intravenous, and drip injections. Children receive vaccinations. The rural clinic helps many internally displaced people. The facility receives 50–60 patients daily.







# DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING (4,260)

In April, our regular partners — the **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** Foundation — continued feeding residents of Kharkiv affected by the war. During the month, they managed to:

- Prepare and distribute 1,500 hot meals, 4,500 sandwiches, and sweets to people at evacuation points;
- Respond to 22 shelling incidents and distribute there 8,000 hot meals, 15,000 sandwiches, and hot drinks for the affected, rescuers, and volunteers clearing debris;
- Prepare 1,200 hot meals for people living in shelters for internally displaced persons;
- Deliver 2,000 hot meals and sweets to lonely elderly people living in frontline areas of Kharkiv region.

Additionally, in April, **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** baked 2,500 paskas (Easter breads), which were distributed to orphaned children, children who lost parents due to the war, internally displaced persons in Kharkiv, and elderly people. This month, we helped the foundation purchase food supplies for a month and pay for the rent of the facility where the food is prepared.



# DELIVERY OF PASKAS TO PEOPLE LIVING IN FRONTLINE TERRITORIES (4,500)

The favorite holiday of the **LET'S HELP** team is Easter. For the second year in a row, we have been helping Ukrainians who live under constant shelling to receive warmth and care on this day. Together with the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** Foundation, we sent 4,650 paskas (Easter breads) to frontline areas of Donetsk and Dnipropetrovsk regions.

The paskas were received by families with children, elderly people, internally displaced persons, and those living near the front line. For them, this was a sign of attention and support on the brightest holiday.







# DELIVERY OF BREAD TO RESIDENTS OF FRONTLINE AREAS (1,910)

In April, with the help of the **VILNA UA** Foundation, we continued supporting the residents of three villages in the Kramatorsk district of Donetsk region. A total of 485 people live in these settlements, and they are practically cut off from food supplies.

One of the villages is located 9 km from the front line, where fighting is ongoing. The local store burned down last summer, and the residents have no way to buy food. There are also no stores in the other two villages. Mandatory evacuation of this area took place immediately after its deoccupation in 2022. All this time, life in the villages has been consistently difficult, but not so much as to force elderly people to leave their homes.

Large humanitarian organizations do not reach this area due to security protocols. The residents receive a humanitarian food package from the government once every few months. Our Ukrainian partners managed to find a volunteer who used to deliver bread there and is ready to do so again now. Thanks to your donations, for the third month in a row we have been delivering fresh bread once a week to the residents of these three villages. This is a recurring campaign because food is constantly needed for 485 people.



#### DELIVERY OF ANIMAL FEED TO UKRAINE



We cooperate with a volunteer initiative from Stockholm that helps animals in Ukraine. Our Swedish partners collect food, medicine, and care products for cats and dogs, and we take responsibility for delivering this aid to Ukraine.

The humanitarian parcels are sent to small private shelters and local volunteers who take care of the animals.

Thanks to your support, in April we managed to send over 2,100 kg of food to Vinnytsia, Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Odesa, and other regions of Ukraine.




# FOOD, MEDICATION, AND TREATMENT FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS €3,130

The organization **ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA** evacuates animals from combat zones, treats rescued animals, and finds them new homes. The foundation's shelter in Kharkiv currently houses 127 cats and 20 dogs.

Thanks to the help of **LET'S HELP**, this month the team managed to:

- Purchase pet food, medicine, and cat litter;
- Pay for the treatment and care of sick animals in the veterinary clinic's hospital;
- Cover the rent of the shelter premises;
- Buy an industrial vacuum cleaner for cleaning the shelter and secure the terrace with netting to keep the animals safe.

In the photo — the kittens Devi and Jynks. They were evacuated from Kupiansk during intense fighting. At the shelter, the kittens were treated, cared for, and found a loving family. The girls were Kharkiv residents only briefly; now they live their best life in Copenhagen.



# PADS, MEDICATIONS, AND SOLAR PANELS FOR A SHELTER IN KHARKIV (3,010)

Despite sleepless nights under shelling and the moral exhaustion of Kharkiv residents, in April the team of the **KHARKIV CITY SHELTER** continued to help animals. During the month, 211 dogs and cats passed through the shelter. Veterinarians operated on 137 animals, and 70 pets found new families or were transferred to the care of public organizations. Another 87 animals were released to the streets under the guardianship of locals in Kharkiv. Currently, the shelter houses 427 animals: 369 dogs and 58 cats.

Sometimes the team receives unusual beneficiaries. In the photo — a roe deer that volunteers brought in April from the combat zone with a severe leg injury. Unfortunately, part of the leg had to be amputated. In the wild, the roe deer would not survive without that part of the leg, so now it lives in a large fenced area under the care of a person who takes care of roe deer, deer, and wild goats.

In April, we helped the shelter purchase pads for postoperative care, veterinary medicines, and solar panels to save money on electricity bills.



#### STOVES FOR RESIDENTS OF FRONTLINE AREAS



In April, we supported a public organization from Kherson. Its volunteers are engaged in evacuating civilians and assisting people who are forced to remain in frontline areas.

Thanks to your donations, we were able to purchase materials to make 35 stoves for cooking and heating. Such devices are very important for settlements that have lost gas supply. The stoves were sent to families living without gas (and many also without electricity) in Kherson, as well as in Kherson and Mykolaiv regions.



# GROCERIES AND BED LINEN FOR THE ELDERLY FROM ORIKHIV (2,650)

This month, we again helped purchase food for the shelter in the Zaporizhzhia region. It is home to 24 elderly people with limited mobility. They were evacuated from frontline Orikhiv, and they have nowhere to return to because their homes are completely destroyed. Some of them are over 90 years old, many have diabetes and other serious illnesses. The shelter itself faces major problems with nutrition: there isn't enough money for quality food.

Thanks to your donations, the elderly continue to eat fresh and healthy food. We gradually send them money, and this fundraising continues because healthy nutrition is always needed for the elders.

Additionally, in April we helped the shelter purchase 40 sets of bed linen — unfortunately, the situation in Orekhiv is worsening, so the city is preparing to be evacuated even by those elderly people who have remained there until now. Your donations provided new arrivals with bed linen.



### KATERYNA'S FAMILY FROM CHAPLYNE (£850)

Kateryna, her mother, husband, and three children lived in the village of Chaplyne and loved their home. On January 21, it was destroyed by a Russian missile. The chief doctor of the hospital where Kateryna works temporarily provided the family with two hospital rooms.

The family lived in the hospital for three months. Kateryna's eldest daughter, Vika, has suffered from panic attacks since the shelling began in 2022, and the younger children, Ruslan and Maryna, constantly require eye treatment. Due to stress, Kateryna was unable to sleep properly all this time.

We are raising funds so that the family can rent an apartment for six months. In April, we already sent them part of the collected amount. This helped Kateryna and her family move into new housing, but the fundraising continues.




### MYKOLA'S FAMILY FROM KRYVYI RIH (1,500)

On April 4, the Russian army shelled a residential neighborhood in Kryvyi Rih. One of the victims, 21-year-old medical university student Mykola Herashchenko, had come to his parents' apartment the day before the explosion — the place where he spent his childhood.

Unfortunately, the family's apartment was damaged by the blast: windows and balconies were shattered by the shockwave, and the walls were riddled with shrapnel. We sent Mykola and his relatives funds to replace the windows and balconies so they could continue living in their home.

#### MARYNA'S FAMILY FROM KRYVYI RIH (\$1,700)



Maryna's family was also at the epicenter of the shelling in Kryvyi Rih on April 4. At the time of the explosion, Marina, her husband, and their young daughter were at home. Fortunately, they themselves were not seriously injured, which cannot be said about their apartment.

The blast wave shattered the windows and interior doors, damaged the ceiling and some walls, and in the children's room part of a wall collapsed and a radiator was blown out. We helped the family install new windows.

### MYSHA'S FAMILY FROM SUMY 1,500

13-year-old Mysha from Sumy suffered a mine-explosion injury after a shelling in the city on April 13 — the boy has a brain injury, concussion, and an abdominal wound.

Mysha is currently in Kyiv, in the surgical department of a hospital. Alla, his mother, rented accommodation nearby on a daily basis to be close to her son.

Most likely, Mysha will have to spend several months in rehabilitation. We helped Alla with paying the rent for the apartment.

# VEHICLE REPAIR TO SUPPORT FRONTLINE TERRITORIES AID 1646

Since 2022, Dmytro Yeliseenko has been helping in his native Mykolaiv region: delivering humanitarian aid to de-occupied villages, feeding animals, repairing homes, and simply supporting everyone who is struggling. In 2023, he stepped on a mine while helping relatives during the sowing season. Despite his injury, Dmytro continues his volunteer work. He currently oversees 13 villages. Apart from him, almost no one else reaches these places.

To deliver humanitarian aid and transport elderly people to the hospital, Dmytro needed a van — we raised the money for it together at the beginning of 2025. Now the vehicle has broken down, and we helped fix it so that the aid work could continue.



### OLHA FROM POLAND (£476)

Olha had to leave Kharkiv in 2022. She moved to Poland together with her mother, two children, and two dogs. The family still lives there now. Unfortunately, after some time, Olha's mother was diagnosed with cancer. Currently, Olha cannot work much because her mother requires constant care. Savings and income from side jobs are no longer enough to cover living expenses — rent, heating, and medication costs have become an overwhelming burden for the family.

This month, we once again helped the family with paying their rent.



### IRYNA FROM LATVIA (157)

In April, Iryna from Latvia reached out to us for support. We had already helped her with paying for a room in a dormitory last autumn.

Now the woman is again in a critical situation: she experienced an asthma exacerbation, and because of the cold in the dormitory, Iryna developed pneumonia and is temporarily unable to work. We helped Iryna pay for the room rent for one month.

May God grant you and your colleagues health, good luck, and all the best! What would I do without you?



#### HELP FOR REFUGEE CHILDREN IN ESTONIA

€8,747)

In April, we were able to help more teams thanks to the **Art Against War** auction. It was held by an initiative friendly to us, which transferred part of the proceeds to "**LET'S HELP**." Among other things, we supported the **OGOGO** project, which works with Ukrainian refugee children in Estonia.

**0G0G0** began its work onboard a ferry that was temporarily converted to accommodate refugees. More than 600 children lived there. For a whole year, the team held classes, developmental activities, and psychological support sessions for them. Today, **0G0G0** operates in a rented space in Tallinn, where about 40 children regularly attend. In total, over 550 children have received support since the project began. Furthermore, 17 Ukrainian refugees found jobs through the project, including positions as teachers and organizers at **0G0G0**.

The funds are used to pay for the rental of the space for classes (paid through the end of summer 2025), provide meals for the children, conduct developmental and educational programs, and cover salaries for Ukrainian teachers living in exile.
