

SUPPORT TO AN IDP SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

At the shelter run by our partners — the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** Foundation — in the Dnipropetrovsk region, around 80 people live permanently. Another 20 or so find temporary refuge there each month.

In May, your donations helped the shelter team:

- receive a new wave of evacuees, including people with amputations and other injuries;
- purchase hygiene products, medicines, and food;
- set up an additional room for 12 people to accommodate more transit residents;
- assist new arrivals in applying for state aid;
- organize group therapy sessions with a psychologist, and bring in rehabilitation specialists and hairdressers, as well as help people with poor eyesight get glasses.

In the photo — Tolik from Kurakhove. He used to have poor vision, but after a nervous breakdown, he lost his sight completely. Volunteers from the foundation arranged cataract surgery for Tolik. Now, one of his eyes can see again, and in time, doctors will try to restore vision in the other as well.







SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY

Our partners evacuate Ukrainians from frontline areas. Their top priority is helping those who are especially vulnerable — bedridden and people with limited mobility. Once evacuated, they are placed in a specially equipped shelter, which also has enclosures for their pets. There, evacuees receive care, as well as medical and psychological support. Here's one of their stories.

65-year-old Petro from the Kharkiv region can only move around with a cane — both indoors and outside. Since the start of the full-scale invasion, his village has had no medical center or store. Once a week, humanitarian aid is delivered, along with a mobile shop. Living in such conditions is nearly impossible for an elderly person with limited mobility. That's why in May, the team evacuated him.

"It's quiet here, peaceful — life has gotten a little better. For the first time in a long while, I can simply rest. They help me, feed me, clothe me — I really like it," Petro shares.

Thanks to your support, the residents of this shelter — and their animals — live in warmth and care.



EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS (3,800)

Other Ukrainian partners of **LET'S HELP** work on developing evacuation routes, providing information and financial assistance to help Ukrainians living in occupied territories, frontline zones, or those deported to Russia reach safe places.

In May, with our support, the team helped evacuate 13 people: eight women and five men. Eight of them had limited mobility, and two were completely immobile.

Here's one story of an evacuation from an occupied territory:

Mykhailo (name changed) is 68 years old and from the Kherson region. His family contacted our partners back in the spring, but at that time he was hospitalized after suffering a stroke. His left arm and leg were paralyzed. It took some time to stabilize his condition in order to prepare for evacuation.

To help him cross the border, our partners provided him with a mobility chair and found a companion to accompany him. On the Ukrainian-controlled side, Mykhailo was met by his daughter. Together, they went home.



DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING £5,320

In May, our long-time partners — the **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** foundation — continued providing meals to Kharkiv residents affected by the war. Over the month, they managed to prepare and deliver:

- 1,650 hot meals, 5,000 sandwiches, and sweets to people at evacuation points;
- Around 3,500 hot meals, over 10,000 sandwiches, and hot drinks for survivors, first responders, and volunteers clearing rubble after night attacks;
- 2,000 hot meals for people with limited mobility living in shelters for internally displaced persons (IDPs);
- About 2,000 hot meals for elderly individuals living alone in frontline areas of Kharkiv region;
- 2,000 sandwiches to the evacuation hub in the city of Sumy these fed drivers, volunteers working on evacuations, and first responders clearing rubble;
- Over 700 hot meals and 3,000 sandwiches for volunteers boarding up windows after attacks in Kharkiv region.

This month, we helped the foundation purchase food and disposable tableware for a full month, and covered the cost of renting a kitchen space.





DELIVERY OF BREAD TO RESIDENTS OF FRONTLINE AREAS (1,910)

In May, with the help of the **VILNA UA** foundation, we continued supporting residents of three villages in the Kramatorsk district of Donetsk region. These communities are home to 485 people and are nearly completely cut off from food supplies.

One of the villages is just 9 km from the frontline, with constant shelling and active fighting. The local store burned down last summer, and residents have no way to buy food. The other two villages also have no stores. Mandatory evacuation took place right after the area was deoccupied in 2022. Life in these villages has remained consistently difficult, but not enough to make the elderly residents abandon their homes.

Major humanitarian organizations do not deliver aid to these areas due to security protocols. Residents receive government-issued food parcels only once every few months. Our Ukrainian partners managed to find a volunteer — someone who used to deliver bread there and is willing to continue doing so now.

Thanks to your donations, for the fourth month in a row, we've been able to deliver fresh bread to these three villages once a week. This is a recurring campaign, as food is a constant necessity for the people living there.



FOOD, MEDICATION, AND TREATMENT FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS (2,355)

ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA is an organization that evacuates animals from combat zones, provides medical treatment to rescued animals, and helps them find new homes. The foundation's shelter in Kharkiv is currently home to 129 cats and 20 dogs.

Thanks to support from **LET'S HELP**, the team was able to:

- purchase food, medicine, and litter for the animals;
- pay the rent for the shelter space;
- fund surgery for a cat with a nasal condition that made it difficult to breathe;
- cover a second terrace with mesh to ensure the animals' safety.

The photo shows Abrikos the cat. He was evacuated from the village of Lypsti in Kharkiv region last fall. Abrikos is a quiet, gentle cat — the kind often overlooked — so he's still living in the shelter. He recently got sick, developing autoimmune issues, digestive problems, and kidney concerns. Thanks to your donations, Abrikos received medical treatment at a clinic. He's now healthy again — and still waiting for a loving family to take him home.

MEDICATIONS, MICROSCOPE PARTS, AND FOOD FOR A SHELTER IN KHARKIV £2,990

In May, Kharkiv endured around 100 missile and drone strikes. On May 31, the shelter of our partner organization was affected by a blast wave. The roof of the enclosure for stray cats was damaged, windows cracked, and ceiling light fixtures fell down. Fortunately, none of the staff or animals were harmed.

Despite everything, the shelter took in 159 dogs and 73 cats in May. Veterinarians performed surgeries on 140 animals, and 97 animals found new families or were placed under the care of other organizations. Currently, the shelter houses 388 dogs and 81 cats.

In the photo: a dog named Kukla with her owner. The man used to live in Vovchansk, but his house was destroyed, so he had to evacuate to Kharkiv. One evening, during heavy shelling, Kukla got scared and ran away. She was later found by city park employees and brought to the Kharkiv shelter. The shelter team posted about her on Facebook. The man saw the post, was overjoyed to learn that his dog was safe — and came to take his beloved pet home.

Thanks to your support in May, we helped the shelter purchase veterinary medications, spare parts to repair a microscope, reagents for lab tests, and dog food.

GROCERIES FOR THE ELDERLY FROM ORIKHIV (1,780)

This month, we once again helped purchase groceries for a shelter in the Zaporizhzhia region. It is home to 24 elderly people with limited mobility. They were evacuated from the front-line town of Orikhiv, and there is nowhere for them to return — their homes have been completely destroyed. Some of them are over 90 years old, and many suffer from diabetes and other serious illnesses.

The shelter struggles to provide adequate meals — there simply isn't enough funding for quality food.

Thanks to your donations, these elderly people continue to receive fresh and nutritious meals. We are gradually transferring funds to support them, and this fundraising campaign is ongoing — because healthy food is a constant need for these seniors.

OLHA FROM POLAND (£471)

Olha had to leave Kharkiv in 2022. She moved to Poland with her mother, two children, and two dogs. The family is still living there. Unfortunately, after some time, Olga's mother was diagnosed with cancer. Now Olha cannot work much because her mother requires constant care. Their savings and income from side jobs are no longer enough to cover living expenses — paying for housing, heating, and medicines has become an unbearable burden for the family.

This month, we helped the family again by assisting with their rent payment.
