



## SUPPORT TO AN IDP SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION 1/2

At the shelter run by our partners — the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation — in the Dnipropetrovsk region, around 110 people live there permanently. Another 20 or so find temporary refuge there each month. Some of them have lost loved ones, others have been seriously wounded, and all have lost their

homes because of the war. In June, your donations helped the shelter team to:

- Welcome new evacuees and find rental housing for two families who had been living at the shelter for a long time;
- Apply for pensions for three people and temporary displaced person status for 14 others —
   all of whom are now receiving state support;
- Purchase hygiene products, medicines, and food;
- Repair the roof of one of the buildings and carry out pest control.

Also in June, the foundation's team helped set up a small service station on the grounds of the transit shelter. Now, several displaced people from frontline and occupied areas have their own small business. For them, it's not just a way to earn money — it's a true motivation to keep going.

### SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY



Our long-time partners evacuate bedridden and people with limited mobility from frontline areas. They are then placed in a specially equipped shelter — one without bunk beds, which are unsuitable for people with mobility issues. The shelter also has pet enclosures, because many evacuees refuse to leave without their animals.

In June, the team rescued 8 people, 6 cats, and 6 dogs. A total of 14 residents live in the shelter permanently. They receive medical, legal, and psychological care, and **LET'S HELP** is part of this effort. Our executive director Sonya Zhukova helps evacuees obtain the documents they need.

Thanks to your support, both the people and their pets are safe and cared for.

On June 6, 61-year-old Serhii Mykolaiovych was brought to the shelter from Kupiansk. He lost his wife and has been alone ever since. Of his three apartments, none survived. Serhii has painful legs and suffers from diabetes. Due to an insulin-related error, his vision began to fail, and now he is almost completely blind. His daughter-in-law had been caring for him, but when she evacuated, Serhii decided to leave too. Volunteers evacuated him — first to Kharkiv, and then to the shelter.





# EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS (3,800)

Other **LET'S HELP** partners work to evacuate Ukrainians from occupied territories, frontline zones, and those forcibly deported to Russia. After evacuation, the team provides people with financial, legal, and psychological support.

In June, with our support, they organized the evacuation of 15 Ukrainians — 8 women and 7 men. Among them were 9 people with limited mobility and one completely bedridden person.

Here's one of the stories from occupied territory:

Mykhailo (name changed), 79, is from the Donetsk region. He recently suffered a hip fracture, and local doctors said the bone wouldn't heal. Mykhailo struggled to accept his condition — he refused help and wouldn't agree to leave, even though his family in Ukraine was waiting for him.

Eventually, his daughter found doctors willing to operate and support his recovery. Only then did he agree to evacuate. He made the journey lying down, with a wheelchair and a team of companions helping him cross the border. His daughter met him right after, and now they're finally together.



### DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING \$5,320 Thank yo

Thank you so much for your help

In June, Russian forces shelled Kharkiv 142 times — the highest number of attacks since the start of the full-scale invasion. Despite this, our long-time partners, the **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** foundation, continued to feed affected residents across the city. Over the month, they managed to prepare and distribute:

- 1,800 hot meals, 7,000 sandwiches, and baked goods for people at evacuation points;
- 1,600 hot meals, 5,000 sandwiches, and hot drinks for victims, rescuers, and volunteers at strike sites;
- 2,300 hot meals and 10,000 sandwiches for evacuees from the Donetsk and Sumy regions;
- 700 hot meals for elderly people living alone in frontline areas;
- 1,000 hot meals and 5,000 sandwiches for volunteers boarding up windows after attacks;
- 3,000 hot meals for people with limited mobility;
- 2.000 hot meals for children with disabilities.

This month, we helped the foundation purchase groceries, disposable tableware for a month, thermal containers, and pay rent for the kitchen space.

### DELIVERY OF BREAD TO RESIDENTS OF FRONTLINE AREAS (1,910)

In June, with the help of the **VILNA UA** foundation, we continued delivering two loaves of fresh bread

each week to 485 residents of three villages in the Kramatorsk district of the Donetsk region.

One of the villages lies just 9 km from the front line, where active fighting continues. The only store there burned down last summer. In the other two villages, there are no shops either — meaning that 485 people rely entirely on humanitarian aid, which rarely reaches them. Major organizations avoid the area due to safety protocols, and the government sends basic supplies only once every few months.

Our partners found a local volunteer who used to deliver bread to these villages and is now doing it again. Thanks to your donations, we've been able to deliver fresh bread every week for five months. This is a recurring fundraiser — because food is a constant need.

## FOOD, MEDICATION, AND TREATMENT FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS £2,935

**ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA** is an organization that rescues animals from active war zones, provides medical care, and finds them new homes. At the moment, their shelter in Kharkiv houses 129 cats and 25 dogs. With your support, the team was able to:

- purchase food, medications, and litter for the animals;
- cover the shelter's rent for the month;
- pay for dental surgery for three shelter cats;
- pay for lab tests for animals with epilepsy and kidney disease;
- cover the sterilization of newly arrived cats;
- hire a caretaker to help look after the animals.

Pictured is Bagheera, a cat rescued from the war-torn village of Lypci in Kharkiv region. She had been stranded on the third floor of a destroyed building, crying loudly until volunteers managed to reach her and bring her to the shelter. Bagheera was taken to a clinic, examined, treated, and sterilized. Now she has a roof over her head, food, and loving care.



# MEDICINE, SURGICAL SUPPLIES, AND VACCINES FOR A SHELTER IN KHARKIV €3,150

Despite constant shelling, the **KHARKIV CITY SHELTER** continued to take in, treat, and care for animals throughout June. Over the month, the team welcomed 198 animals — 152 dogs and 46 cats. Among them were kittens rescued from active combat zones. Veterinarians performed 96 surgeries, and 90 animals found new homes or were transferred into the care of partner organizations.

As of now, the shelter is home to 434 animals — 351 dogs and 83 cats.

Thanks to your support, the shelter was able to purchase surgical supplies, veterinary medications for treatment and parasite prevention, as well as vaccines and anti-inflammatory drugs.

Pictured is one of the dogs rescued in June. A local volunteer asked the clinic staff for help treating three dogs he had saved from another shelter where they had been mistreated. Their condition was critical — most likely the dogs had been kept in unsanitary conditions, without proper care, clean drinking water, good food, vaccinations, or medical attention. Now they are recovering under the care of Kharkiv shelter veterinarians.






#### **GROCERIES FOR THE ELDERLY FROM ORIKHIV**



In June, we once again provided funds to purchase food for a shelter in the Zaporizhzhia region. Several dozen elderly people live here — all over the age of 80, most with serious health conditions. A doctor visits daily, and a nurse is on duty 24/7. They have nowhere to return — their homes were destroyed.

The shelter struggles to provide proper nutrition — there's not enough money for quality food.

Thanks to your support, these seniors are now receiving fresh, nutritious meals. However, funds are only enough for one more month, so the fundraiser remains open. You can help the elderly by donating at the link:

### DELIVERY OF GENERATORS TO FRONTLINE VILLAGES

Another **LET'S HELP** partner is the **KORIDOR UA** organization. Their team supports civilians in frontline and heavily affected regions of Ukraine: delivering humanitarian kits, windows, solar panels, medical and construction supplies. They also help rebuild destroyed homes and schools.

In June, the team received urgent requests for help from residents of frontline villages in Kherson region. Infrastructure there has been severely damaged, and constant power outages make generators a necessity.

Thanks to your support, **KORIDOR UA** was able to purchase and deliver 7 generators:

- 2 were sent to two villages to provide light and phone charging for locals;
- 1 is used for lighting during post-strike repair work;
- 1 powers a local water supply system;
- 2 were sent to villages with no electricity at all they now operate in "Points of Invincibility", where people can warm up, drink hot tea, and charge their devices when power is out.





# ACTIVITY KITS FOR CHILDREN IN A SHELTER IN DNIPRO (1,455)

Due to the Russian invasion, thousands of Ukrainian children are spending their childhoods in shelters. Many of them have lost everything — even their favorite crayons and toys.

Together with **THE INSIDER**, we launched a fundraiser for Children's Day on June 1st. The donations were used to buy kits for kids whose families fled their homes because of Russian attacks and found refuge in a mother-and-child shelter in Dnipro.

Thanks to your contributions, we were able to fund 338 kits, each including markers, a coloring book, modeling clay, gummy candy, juice, and a toy.




#### SUPPORT FOR RESIDENTS AFFECTED (£42 BY MISSILE STRIKES IN DNIPRO



PAYMENT ORDER

On June 24, the Russian army shelled Dnipro and the Dnipropetrovsk region. More than 160 people were injured, including passengers on a train traveling from Odesa to Zaporizhzhia. Around 40 educational institutions and 8 medical facilities were damaged, and tram lines were knocked out of service.

Thanks to your support through **LET'S HELP**, our partners at the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** foundation were able to reach the affected areas and provide people with water and basic necessities.



#### WINDOWS FOR A SHELTER IN ZAPORIZHZHIA

On June 14, Russian forces shelled Zaporizhzhia.

Eight windows were blown out in one of the shelters, which houses 72 people — 26 of them children. Fortunately, no one was injured.

Through our partner foundation, **VILNA UA**, we helped replace the windows in the shelter.








#### MARYNA'S FAMILY FROM KYIV (2,000)

On the night of June 17, the Russian army shelled Kyiv. Twenty-eight people were killed, and 142 were injured.

Among the survivors was Maryna Dziuban, along with her husband, two children, and mother-in-law. They had relocated to Kyiv from Donetsk and were renting an apartment that was hit by a drone. The home was severely damaged in the attack, and the family could no longer stay there. This was the second home they lost due to the Russian invasion.

We helped the family cover the rent for a new place and purchase essential items.

#### MAKSYM'S FAMILY FROM MELITOPOL (\$504)



Maksym from Melitopol and his wife are both living with HIV and have disabilities. Together with their young son and two cats, they had to flee their hometown and relocate to Zaporizhzhia. Life there has been difficult. The family is currently living in a dormitory and doing their best to rebuild their lives for the sake of their child's future.

We helped the family purchase food, hygiene products, and essential medications.

### IRYNA FROM LATVIA £171

In June, we once again supported Iryna, who is living alone in Latvia. For several months now, we've been helping her cover the cost of a dormitory room.

Recently, Iryna faced another crisis: she suffered a severe asthma flare-up, which landed her in the hospital and made it impossible for her to work.

We covered a month's rent for her room so that she wouldn't have to worry about losing her shelter and could focus on recovering in peace.

### OLHA FROM POLAND (£472)

In 2022, Olha had to flee to Poland with her mother, two children, and two dogs. The family still lives there today.

Unfortunately, some time later, her mother was diagnosed with cancer. She now requires constant care, which means Olha is unable to work full-time. Savings and occasional earnings are no longer enough — covering rent, heating, and medication has become an unmanageable burden for the family.

In June, we once again helped the family by covering their rent.
