



FROM THE TEAM

For the second month now, we are writing to you about how we at **LET'S HELP** spent this month. Unfortunately, once again we have to say that there were many attacks. But the story that touched us most deeply in August is the story of Dmytro from Kyiv. On the night of July 31, he stayed at their summer house with his youngest son Andrii, while his wife Nataliia and their two older sons, Vladyslav and Roman, went back to the city. That night, a rocket hit their home. Dmytro was left alone with his 11-year-old boy.

Together with you, we collected almost €2,000 for Dmytro and his son. But most importantly — we helped Andrii celebrate his birthday. Our friends from Kyiv delivered his favorite cake, honey cake, to the boy — exactly the kind of cake his deceased mother used to bake. On social media, we shared that Andrii wanted to learn to play the guitar, just like his late older brother Vladik. After that, one of our followers reached out to us. The woman told us that she had a new guitar at home in Ukraine that nobody played. When she saw Dmytro's story, she realized: this was the moment that guitar would find its purpose — and sent the guitar to the child. Andrii and his dad blew up balloons, made wishes, and — perhaps for the first time since the 11-year-old boy lost his two beloved brothers and his mother — he smiled again. All of this was possible because every month, thousands of people continue to support us. We are deeply grateful to you.

The chance not only to raise funds, but also to take action ourselves, keeps us going. And we are encouraged by the fact that monthly donations remain steady, and new people continue to join us.

EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS \$\(\frac{43.800}{3.800}\)

Anonymous partners of **LET'S HELP** provide evacuation for Ukrainians living in occupied territories and frontline zones, or who have been deported to Russia. The team plans exit routes for them and accompanies them throughout the entire journey. Afterward, our partners assist with the reintegration of the rescued individuals. In August, the organization's staff carried out the evacuation of 15 people. Eight of them had limited mobility, and one was completely immobile.

Here is one evacuation story from an occupied territory in the Luhansk region.

Iryna (name changed) previously moved around the house with a walker, but after a stroke, she became almost bedridden — barely able to sit. She is conscious only for short periods, and her speech and understanding of what is happening are impaired. With the help of a family acquaintance, our partners were able to take Iryna from the hospital. During the journey, she was provided with everything she needed. In Kovel, she was met by her son. Together, they traveled to the Kyiv region, where her son arranged for Iryna to receive treatment and rehabilitation.

GROCERIES FOR THE ELDERLY FROM ORIKHIV



In August, we once again sent assistance for the purchase of food for a shelter in the Zaporizhzhia region. Several dozen elderly people from Orikhiv have found refuge there. Many of them are over 80 and have no remaining family.

Almost every resident of the shelter suffers from serious illnesses, so it is crucial that their diet is complete and follows the doctor's recommendations. However, the shelter does not have enough funds to provide people with high-quality food. For a long time, the elderly had to rely on canned food and dairy products made from powdered baby formula.

Thanks to your donations, for the past six months, the grandmothers and grandfathers have been receiving fresh and varied meals that support their health and strength.

We continue to collect donations so that this assistance does not stop. Please support this fundraiser.

DELIVERY OF BREAD TO RESIDENTS OF FRONTLINE AREAS (1,910)

For the past six months, together with the **VILNA UA** foundation, we have been helping people living under shelling without food.

In three villages in the Kramatorsk district of the Donetsk region, there are 485 people. There are no grocery stores, and humanitarian aid from the government arrives only once a month. More than 60% of the local residents are pensioners. They cannot leave their homes because they have no relatives able to take them in.

Thanks to your donations, our partners deliver two loaves of fresh bread every week to each person in these three villages. We continue fundraising for this project because people constantly need food. You can support the residents of the frontline areas in Donetsk region here:

DELIVERY OF GENERATORS TO FRONTLINE VILLAGES (2,500)

Another one of our partners is **KORIDOR UA**. The team supports the civilian population in the Kyiv, Kharkiv, Donetsk, Dnipropetrovsk, Mykolaiv, and Odesa regions of Ukraine. The organization delivers humanitarian aid packages, windows, solar panels, medical and construction materials. In addition, Koridor UA restores damaged homes and schools.

In August, the team once again received an urgent request for help from residents of a frontline village in the Kherson region.

Thanks to your donations, **KORIDOR UA** delivered a powerful generator and a charging station to the community, where infrastructure is destroyed and electricity is frequently cut off. Now the local residents have the ability to stay warm, cook hot meals, and charge their phones even when there is no power.



SUPPORT FOR TO A SHELTER FOR IDPS IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION (5,000)

At the shelter of our partners — the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation — in the Dnipropetrovsk region, around 110 people live permanently. Another approximately 20 people find temporary refuge there each month.

In August, your donations helped the team to:

- purchase hygiene products, medicines, and food;
- receive new evacuated residents, including those with injuries and post-hospital care needs;
- renovate a room to eliminate mold;
- find and assist four families from the shelter in renting housing;
- conduct group and individual psychological counseling sessions;
- organize the visit of a medical team to examine the residents.

SUPPORT FOR A CAR SERVICE STATION RUN BY SHELTER RESIDENTS IN THE 470 DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

Two months ago, residents of the shelter of our partners in the Dnipropetrovsk region opened a car service station. They started by repairing neighbors' cars, and thanks to word of mouth, they soon began servicing vehicles of other city residents as well. For the staff — internally displaced people from frontline and occupied territories — this is not just a way to earn money, but a real motivation to keep going.

To help their initiative grow, we launched a fundraiser for the missing tools and equipment for the service station. In August, we sent them the collected funds.



EQUIPPING A SHELTER IN A SCHOOL IN ZAPORIZHZHIA £2,535

Due to constant shelling, schoolchildren in Ukraine are often forced to take shelter during lessons. Sometimes the attacks are so frequent that children spend an entire school day in the shelters.

In August, we launched a fundraiser to equip a school shelter in Zaporizhzhia. Two schools evacuated from the occupied part of the Zaporizhzhia region are housed in the building. A total of 245 children attend classes there.

Cosmetic repairs have already been made in the shelter. Now it needs to be equipped with desks, chairs, boards, mats, and other necessary items to become a proper learning space. The underground classrooms will even have resource zones, so children with special needs can study alongside other students. In addition, residents of nearby houses will be able to use the shelter during shelling.

In August, we sent part of the collected funds so that the children could soon have the necessary desks, chairs, and boards. The fundraiser is ongoing, and you can support it via the link:

DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING £5,000

In August, our regular partners — the **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** foundation — continued feeding people affected by the war. During the month, they were able to prepare and distribute:

- 1,750 hot meals, 5,000 sandwiches, sweets, and drinks for people at evacuation points in Kharkiv;
- 2,500 hot meals, 7,000 sandwiches, fruits, and water for victims, rescuers, and volunteers at arrivals;
- 2,500 hot meals for a shelter housing people with limited mobility who were evacuated;
- 550 hot meals, 2,500 sandwiches, and water for volunteers and evacuees from the Sumy region;
- 3,000 hot meals, desserts, and juices for children of temporarily displaced people.

We helped the foundation purchase food, disposable tableware for the month, and pay for the rental of the kitchen space.

MEDICINE, SURGICAL SUPPLIES, VACCINES FOR A PET SHELTER IN KHARKIV €3,010

Despite the ongoing attacks on Kharkiv, August was the calmest month of the summer for the city's residents. In August, our partners took in 141 animals — 109 dogs and 32 cats. The shelter's veterinarians performed surgeries on 109 animals, and 108 animals either found new families or were placed under the care of public organizations. Currently, the shelter houses 483 animals — 411 dogs and 72 cats. Thanks to your donations, in August the team was able to purchase surgical supplies and veterinary medicines for the treatment of the animals.

In the photo is a kitten who, at just three months old, had already suffered from life on the streets. Most likely, he was seeking shelter from bad weather but chose a very dangerous spot — a transformer booth. The kitten received an electric shock. The injury was serious, but the shelter's veterinarians saved his life.

FOOD, MEDICATION, AND TREATMENT FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS £2,360

Other Kharkiv partners of **LET'S HELP** — **ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA** — evacuate animals from combat zones, provide medical care, and find them new homes. Currently, the foundation's shelter houses 135 cats and 17 dogs. With our support this month, the team was able to:

- purchase food, medicines, litter, and cleaning supplies;
- pay for the rental of the facility and utility bills;
- pay for an assistant who will care for the animals.

The dog in the photo is named Mia, and she is 12 years old. In August, she was brought to our partners' shelter after her owner, a Pomeranian's owner, went abroad. After tests and examinations, Mia was found to have several agerelated and other health issues. She is now taking medication, feeling better, and has even adjusted to living with a group of cats. Thanks to the support of **LET'S HELP**, Mia was able to receive examinations, get the necessary medicines, and have her food provided.

SUPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR INTERNALLY DISPLACED PEOPLE AND MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN IN KAMIANSKE (1,190)

In the shelter in Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk region, 30–35 people live permanently. Internally displaced people who have nowhere else to go can find a roof over their heads there. In addition, the shelter provides refuge for mothers with children who find themselves in difficult life situations.

Unfortunately, the shelter faces challenges with food supplies: people receive only grains from volunteer organizations, and local farmers are not always able to provide vegetables and fruits. In August, we sent funds to the shelter to purchase food for a month, so that residents would not have to worry about meals. In addition, we provided the team with money to buy a new washing machine, as the old one broke after many years of use.



DMYTRO'S FAMILY FROM KYIV (£1,950)

On the night of July 31, the Russian army shelled Kyiv. 32 people were killed, and more than 150 were injured. The greatest number of casualties occurred in a high-rise building, where a missile destroyed an entire entrance. Among the victims were Dmytro's wife, his wife's brother, and their two sons. His mother-in-law and the wife's other brother, who lived in the same apartment, sustained only minor injuries. Dmytro and his younger son were out of town that night, which saved their lives.

Now, Dmytro is raising his younger son, Andrii, on his own. We collected funds for them and for the surviving relatives of his wife to cover essential items — clothing, food, and school supplies. We also learned that Andrii dreamed of learning to play the guitar, like his late brother Vladyslav, and one of our subscribers generously gifted him her guitar.

YANA'S FAMILY FROM KAMIANSKE (£1,147)

Yana is a mother of four children. She raises three sons — aged 18, 7, and 5 — and a little preschool daughter. After a rocket directly hit their home in Ukrainsk, Donetsk region, the family was left without a roof over their heads.

Currently, Yana, her husband — a volunteer — and their children are living in Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk region, in a house they were able to rent from her son's teacher. To make the home livable, the family needed beds for the children, a desk, a wardrobe, and basic kitchen equipment. Thanks to the donations we collected, we were able to send them money to help set up their new home.



SVITLANA'S FAMILY FROM KYIV (£1,003)

Svitlana's family from Kyiv was affected by the city shelling on August 28. That night, their apartment was destroyed, and Svitlana, her husband, and their nine-year-old daughter miraculously survived. Tragically, all other residents of the fifth floor of their building were killed in the rocket strike.

The family lost their home and all their belongings, with only the documents kept in a safe surviving. We were able to send them money to help cover rent and purchase essential items.


OLEH AND TETIANA FROM KYIV (1,500)



Oleh and his wife Tetiana are retirees from Kyiv. During the shelling of the city on July 31, they lost their son and their home. Their apartment was completely destroyed—there was nothing left, not even the roof or walls. The hardest hit was their son's room, where he was trapped under a beam while sleeping. Their car, which was parked in the yard, was also destroyed.

Oleh and his wife were in another room and survived by a stroke of luck. They are currently staying with relatives and are waiting for government assistance to rent a new home. The family was able to save a few belongings, but very little. We sent Oleh and Tetiana money to help them buy winter clothing, shoes, and basic necessities.

OLEKSII FROM KOSTIANTYNIVKA



Oleksii is a resident of Kostiantynivka in the Donetsk region. On April 4, 2025, he was caught in shelling. His home was partially destroyed, and Oleksii was seriously injured.

Over the past months, he has been treated in three different hospitals and now struggles to move around even with the help of walkers.

Oleksii now lives in Dnipro with his son and cannot return home, as active fighting continues near Kostiantynivka. They rented an apartment, and while his son works, almost all their money goes toward rent, leaving hardly anything for Oleksii's ongoing rehabilitation.

We sent Oleksii money to purchase a nerve stimulator, a device required for a scheduled surgery to repair his sciatic nerve so he can regain normal mobility.

OLENA FROM CHERNIHIV (£213)

In August, Olena, a single mother from Chernihiv, reached out to us for help again. Her husband passed away in July 2022, and since then, she has been raising her teenage son on her own.

Her salary as an employee of the city water utility barely covers basic living expenses, and the situation in the city has brought additional unexpected costs: during one of the shellings, the windows in her home were blown out, and she had to urgently replace them.

In August, we helped Olena buy food, as well as winter clothing and shoes for her son.
