DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING

€5,700

"Roxana and the team" from Kharkiv prepared and delivered over 25,000 sandwiches and 17,000 servings of hot meals in September. This month, volunteers responded to seven shelling incidents, providing people with meals and offering on-site assistance. For five additional incidents, the team delivered food for rescuers, volunteers, and those affected.

The photo shows an evacuation from Kupiansk, where our partners arrived with tea, coffee, sweets, and sandwiches. There were so many evacuees that Roxana had to return three times with hot tea and food to ensure everyone was fed. The team also delivered 150 meal servings to the evacuation center for those arriving at night.

Your donations to the "Let's Help" campaign covered the costs of renting a space for meal preparation, purchasing ingredients, and delivering ready-to-eat meals to people in need

PURCHASE OF PET FOOD AND SOLAR PANELS FOR AN ANIMAL SHELTER IN KHARKIV

Last month, Kharkiv once again suffered from regular rocket attacks. The "Animal Care Center" team responded to one of these incidents, rescuing two cats. One had a torn wound on its paw and burns. The shelter's veterinarians provided medical care, and the cats' conditions are now stable. With winter approaching and frequent power outages, we helped the shelter acquire solar panels to ensure the continuous operation of their surgery and animal hospital, as well as stock up on food for the next two months.

In the photo is a cat named Chip. He was brought to the shelter with severe injuries from the shelling. Unfortunately, his back leg had to be amputated. Now, Chip is feeling well and, despite all he has endured, continues to seek affection and enjoy life. Once he completes his rehabilitation, he will be looking for a new family.

SHELTER IN DNIPRO (18,740)

In September, the shelter actively took in evacuees from the Pokrovsk district of Donetsk region. Due to the evacuation, the number of temporary residents increased significantly (352 people over the month), so additional sleeping areas had to be set up in an outdoor tent, which was used as long as the weather allowed.

Currently, 89 people live at the shelter, including 21 who arrived in September. Many arrive without belongings, so in addition to housing assistance, the shelter helps with purchasing clothing and medicine.

Your support through the "Let's Help" campaign covered the rent and utilities, provided meals for more than 100 residents daily (both permanent and temporary), installed a new interior door, and funded the shelter coordinators' work — a tremendous help for the team, who had to work several times harder than usual in September.

SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

In September, the shelter continued to receive people forced to evacuate as the front line shifted. Currently, 76 people live here permanently, with more than 20 others passing through the shelter each month. At one point, the kitchen became too cramped for everyone. Thanks to the "Let's Help" campaign, we purchased a new dining table and chairs for the shelter. Additionally, we are helping with ongoing expenses: rent, food, hygiene supplies, bedding, and storage boxes.

In the photo is 79-year-old Olena Ivanovna from Blyzhna Dyliivka. She suffered a stroke due to constant shelling and stress, leaving her paralyzed. She resisted leaving the home she had built with her husband but ultimately had no choice, as staying was too dangerous. Now, Olena Ivanovna lives in the shelter with her daughter and son-in-law.



HELP PROVIDED MONTHLY

A SHELTER HOUSING PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM FRONTLINE AREAS (7,000)

In September, our partners who specialize in evacuating bedridden and mobility-impaired individuals, and then housing them in a special shelter, welcomed 15 new residents. These people were evacuated from the most dangerous areas of the Donetsk, Sumy, and Kharkiv regions. The shelter provides them with basic care, medical and psychological support, and also works to find them permanent housing further from the front lines.

Tetiana Oleksandrovna (name changed) from Kupiansk district arrived at the shelter after suffering severe injuries. She had stepped outside to work in her yard when shelling suddenly began. A powerful explosion went off nearby. When she regained consciousness and realized what was happening, she was already receiving assistance. As a result, Tetiana lost her left leg and arm. She is now awaiting prosthetics, and the shelter is helping her adjust to life under these new conditions.

DELIVERY OF PET FOOD TO UKRAINE 1,250

We support a volunteer organization in Sweden that collects food, medicine, and care supplies for cats and dogs in Ukraine. This assistance is directed toward animals from small private shelters and those living with local volunteers.

Thanks to your donations to the "Let's Help" campaign, pet food was delivered to 37 volunteer organizations in various cities across Ukraine in September.




FOOD AND VACCINATIONS FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS (2,885)

Our new partner, Animal Guardians UA, evacuates animals from conflict zones, cares for the rescued creatures, and seeks new homes for them.

Currently, the shelter run by this charity organization houses 127 cats and 31 dogs. All of them were evacuated from the shelling in the Kharkiv and Donetsk regions, where they once had homes and owners.

We helped Animal Guardians UA purchase food, vaccinate the newly arrived animals, and provide MRI scans for several cats that required this examination urgently.





IRYNA FROM LATVIA **£200**

In September, we received a request for help from Iryna from Latvia, whom we had assisted with her dormitory rent in the spring. Now, the woman has found herself in a critical situation again: she experienced an asthma flare-up, and due to the low temperatures in the dormitory, she got sick, worsening her overall condition. Because of all this, she is currently unable to work. We helped Iryna cover her room rental for a month (€145) and purchase the necessary medication.





SERHII FROM KHERSON (200)



Serhii's house in Kherson was hit by shelling twice: in July and September 2024. During the second strike, he was inside the house and miraculously survived; however, the house became uninhabitable, forcing Serhii to evacuate. Amid the stress, he suffered a heart attack and ended up in the hospital, unsure of how to rebuild his life.

We assisted Serhii in renting a mobile home in a safer location — in Uzhhorod. There, he will be close to his daughter, who also lost her home during the shelling and is currently living in a dormitory for displaced persons.
