



# EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS \$\mathcal{C}\_3.800\$

Anonymous partners of **LET'S HELP** evacuate Ukrainians who are trapped in occupied territories, stuck in frontline zones, or deported to Russia. The team plans safe routes, prepares people for the journey, and escorts them the entire way. Beyond transport, our partners help evacuees restore documents, find housing, and connect with doctors and psychologists.

In September the organization evacuated 13 people; six had limited mobility and two were fully immobile.

Here's one evacuation story from Donetsk region:

Svitlana (name changed) stayed behind with her sister after most of her relatives left before 24 February 2022. A family member looked after them, but in 2022 Svitlana suffered a stroke and never fully recovered. She now walks with difficulty, drags one leg, speaks haltingly, and often confuses words. Her relatives in government-controlled Ukraine doubted she could ever be brought out. Yet they arrived at the checkpoint, overjoyed, waiting with flowers to welcome Svitlana home.

All of this became possible thanks to your donations.



# SUPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR INTERNALLY DISPLACED PEOPLE AND MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN IN KAMIANSKE (1,200)

The shelter in Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk Region, takes in internally displaced people who have nowhere else to go. Mothers with children who find themselves in crisis also seek refuge here. About 35 people live at the shelter permanently.

Unfortunately, food supplies are tight. Volunteer groups can donate only grains, and local farmers can't always deliver fruit and vegetables. In September we sent the shelter funds to cover a month's worth of groceries and to buy a new stove so residents could eat healthy, tasty meals. We also paid for new linoleum for one of the rooms.

Pictured is Mariia from Selydove. She arrived at the shelter at the beginning of the full-scale war. Selydove has been under occupation since autumn 2024, so Mariia has nowhere to return. Together with your support, we can keep helping people whom the war has robbed of everything.



## AID FOR AN IDP SHELTER IN THE £7,04 DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

At the shelter run by our partner — the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation —about 110 people live permanently, and another 20 or so pass through every month. Thanks to your donations, the team was able to:

- buy hygiene supplies, medicine, food, clothing, and a shower chair for residents with limited mobility;
- take in new evacuees, including people injured in the fighting or discharged from hospitals;
- offer individual sessions with a psychologist and run art-therapy classes;
- hold group meetings with lawyers so residents could file for state benefits and prepare the paperwork needed to claim compensation for destroyed homes;
- add extra insulation to the room reserved for transit arrivals, install a new window there, and paint the corridor in the shelter's main building.

Your support keeps this shelter — and the people who depend on it — going.

#### INSTALLING A HEATING SYSTEM IN A SHELTER



A shelter in Dnipropetrovsk Region hosts people evacuated from frontline areas and supplies them with everything they need. Thirty people live there—mostly elderly residents and those with limited mobility — all facing the threat of the coming cold.

Thanks to your donations, we helped the shelter get ready for winter by installing a full heating system. Now its residents can spend the cold months in warmth and comfort.





#### WINDOWS FOR A SHELTER IN ZAPORIZHZHIA



During the night of 21–22 September, Zaporizhzhia came under heavy shelling. One of the local shelters was hit hard. It houses 29 residents, including 12 adults and two children with limited mobility.

Seventeen windows in the living and common areas were blown out. The shelter's director turned to our partners for help.

Thanks to your donations, the shelter now has new windows — and the warmth it needs to make it through the winter.





#### **GROCERIES FOR THE ELDERLY FROM ORIKHIV**



In September we once again sent funds to buy groceries for a shelter in Zaporizhzhia Region. It is home to several dozen elderly people from Orikhiv who have lost both their houses and their families; there is no one else to care for them.

Most residents are over 80, and many suffer from serious illnesses, so a special diet is essential. Yet the shelter has never had enough money to provide balanced meals. For a long time the grandparents survived on canned food and milk products made from powdered baby formula.

With your support, the shelter's residents have been eating tasty, varied dishes for more than six months now and have stayed healthy.

We're keeping the fundraiser open so these grandparents can continue to eat well.

## DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING £7,000

In September our long-time partners — the Kharkiv-based foundation **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM**—cooked and delivered:

First of all, a huge thank-you to all of you from the thousands of residents of Kharkiv and the region

- 3,755 hot lunches, 10,000 sandwiches, sweets, and drinks for evacuees in Kharkiv;
- 1,500 sandwiches, sweets, and drinks for people at the evacuation hub in Lozova, Kharkiv Region;
- 5,000 sandwiches, sweets, and drinks for volunteers and evacuees from Sumy Region;
- 1,100 hot lunches, 5,000 sandwiches, and drinks for victims, rescue workers, and volunteers at strike sites;
- 1,200 hot meals for a shelter housing evacuees;
- 250 hot lunches and 1,000 sandwiches for elderly, low-mobility residents of the Lypetska Hromada in Kharkiv Region.

Thanks to your donations, we helped the foundation buy a month's worth of food and disposable tableware, and we covered the rent on their kitchen space.







#### DELIVERY OF PET FOOD TO UKRAINE (1,00)



In September we once again supported a volunteer initiative based in Stockholm that helps animals in Ukraine. Our Swedish partners collected food, medicines, and care supplies for cats and dogs, while we covered the cost of transporting everything to Ukraine. The parcels went to small private shelters and local volunteers who look after animals.

Thanks to your donations, we delivered more than 1,000 kg of food to cats and dogs in Vinnytsia, Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Odesa, and several other regions of Ukraine.



# MEDICINE, SURGICAL SUPPLIES, VACCINES FOR A PET SHELTER IN KHARKIV (3,110)

In September our partner, the **KHARKIV CITY PET SHELTER**, took in 197 animals: 162 dogs and 35 cats. Shelter vets performed surgery and spay/neuter procedures on 144 of them, while 168 animals found new families or were transferred to the care of local NGOs.

Today the shelter is home to 459 animals — 399 dogs and 60 cats. Thanks to your donations, the team was able to purchase surgical supplies, anesthetics, and wet food for kittens in September.

Pictured is Sugar the kitten. He has already suffered human cruelty: someone struck him hard in the face, tearing the skin on his chin and leaving him completely deaf. Fortunately, a passer-by rushed him to our partner's veterinary center, where vets stitched his lower jaw and treated his injuries. Sugar is now under observation and getting all the care he needs.

# FOOD, MEDICATION, AND TREATMENT FOR EVACUATED CATS AND DOGS \$\omega\$3,000

Another Kharkiv-based partner of **LET'S HELP** — **ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA** — evacuates animals from active combat zones, treats them, and searches for new homes. The foundation's shelter currently houses 137 cats and 16 dogs. With your support this month the team was able to:

- buy food, medicine, litter, and cleaning supplies; cover rent and utility bills for the shelter;
- pay for essential veterinary treatment;
  fund the salary of a caretaker.

The German shepherd in the photo is Buddy. He was stranded in the village of Ruski Tyshky, Kharkiv Region. His owners fled, leaving him behind. For a while soldiers in the area took care of him, but in August they had to change positions and couldn't take the dog along. That's when our partners stepped in and brought Buddy to Kharkiv. He has already found a new home and now lives in Kyiv Region. You, too, could become a family for an animal from **ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA**. #### INNA'S FAMILY FROM ZAKARPATTIA (£3)




Inna Lytvyn is a mother of many children from Zaporizhzhia Region. In 2022 she evacuated to Zakarpattia with her kids. Her husband went to the front, but after two years he was demobilized and stayed on to work in their home village.

On 17 August Inna and the children went back to visit him. That very day their house was shelled. Their 15-year-old son was killed on the spot, and her husband was wounded and died a few days later. Inna was left alone with two children, and she is due to give birth to a baby girl in October.

We raised funds to equip the house that Inna was able to buy with help from caring relatives, and to purchase essentials for the family and the newborn. Thanks to your support, Inna and her children have begun to rebuild a life that was shattered by the war.

### VALENTYNA'S FAMILY FROM ODESA £710

Valentyna, her mother Nataliia, her grandfather, and their cat are IDPs from Kherson. They lived through the occupation and had to flee the city in the summer of 2022. The family has been renting a place in Odesa ever since.

At the moment, Valentyna is the only one who can work. Her grandfather has dementia and is bedridden, so he needs round-the-clock care — Nataliia looks after him full time.

In September the apartment they were renting was suddenly sold, and the family had to find new housing in a hurry. We transferred funds to cover four months of rent on a new flat and to pay for special transport to move the grandfather. Now they no longer fear ending up on the street.

### VIKTOR'S FAMILY FROM ODESA £1,056

Viktor's family also had to leave their native Kherson. Their apartment was damaged by a missile strike, and their country house was ruined when the Kakhovka dam was blown up in 2023. The family now rents a place in Odesa.

Viktor is an elderly cancer patient with very limited mobility; his wife looks after him every day. The family survives on his pension and the small allowance for internally displaced people.

We sent funds to cover six months of rent as well as medicine and hygiene supplies. Now Viktor and his loved ones no longer have to worry about losing their home once again.

#### OLEKSII FROM KOSTIANTYNIVKA



Oleksii is from Kostiantynivka in Donetsk Region. On 4 April 2025 he was caught in a shelling attack: his house was partly destroyed and he himself was badly wounded.

Since then he has been treated in three different hospitals, yet he still hasn't fully recovered and can now move only with a walker.

Oleksii and his son are renting a flat in Dnipro, because fierce fighting continues just outside Kostiantynivka and they cannot go home. The son works, but almost his entire salary goes toward rent, leaving almost nothing for Oleksii's rehabilitation.

In August we sent the family money to buy a nerve stimulator required for a planned operation to reconnect Oleksii's sciatic nerve. This month we helped them purchase the titanium plates for his next surgery — steps that will ultimately allow Oleksii to walk as he did before the injury.





### IRYNA FROM LATVIA (£188)

In September we once again stepped in to help Iryna, who now lives alone in Latvia. We've already covered her dorm-room rent several times, and she recently faced another crisis: she fell ill and had to spend two weeks in bed, unable to work. We paid a full month's rent and provided funds for food and medicine, so Iryna could recover without worrying about losing her roof over her head.
