



#### FROM THE TEAM

In October we completely exhausted our reserve fund. The month also brought a surge in shelling — and with it, a flood of new requests for help. To keep supporting people in need, we did something we'd never done before: we dipped into the money normally earmarked for our team's administrative costs and redirected it to direct aid.

Cold weather has settled over Ukraine, and Russia is once again striking the country's energy grid. Thousands of Ukrainians are freezing in their own homes, unable to cook a hot meal or stay in touch with loved ones. We have launched a series of fund-raisers — for generators, portable power stations, coal briquettes, electric blankets, sweaters — anything that can help people survive yet another wartime winter.

At the same time, Russian forces continue to hit residential neighborhoods. Civilians suffer grievous injuries, losing family members and homes. Of course we can't turn our backs on them, either. That means our workload has doubled, but, sadly, our funding has not. Since the start of 2025, donations to **LET'S HELP** have fallen by 21 %.

We know it's getting harder to give. We know everyone longs to stop thinking about the war and live as normal a life as 2025 allows. But missiles are still striking Ukraine's power plants and cities, and ordinary people are left without heat or food. So we're asking you — please don't stop. Join our fund-raisers and help those in distress. Let's get through this winter together.

In this report you'll find the stories of five families in Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk Region, whose homes are warm today thanks to your donations. Please read about everything we accomplished together in October. Thank you!

#### SUPPORT FOR TWO SHELTERS IN DNIPRO



Our partners, the **CHILDREN NEW GENERATION** foundation, run two shelters in Dnipro. The main one provides a roof over the heads of 65 permanent residents and also accommodates temporary guests — 19 people stayed there for a short time in October. The shelter for mothers and children offers short-term refuge; in October, it housed 98 people, including 43 children. In addition, the foundation helped evacuate 299 people during the month; some were housed at the shelter, while others traveled onward.

We support the shelters by covering costs for rent, utilities, food, medicine, and other essentials.

Pictured is Anna with her children: her daughters, aged 9 and 17, and her 22-year-old son. Their home was destroyed by bombs. The family was first evacuated to Pavlohrad and then brought to our partner's shelter. Thanks to your help, people whose homes have been destroyed by Russian attacks have a safe place to go.



# AID FOR AN IDP SHELTER IN THE 66, DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

The shelter run by our partner, the **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** foundation, in the Dnipropetrovsk region is home to about 110 permanent residents, with another 20 staying temporarily each month. In October, your donations helped the team:

- purchase hygiene supplies, medicine, food, clothing, and wheelchairs for residents with limited mobility;
- welcome new arrivals, including the injured and those discharged from hospitals;
- qrrange for doctor visits and consultations with a psychologist;
- hold art therapy sessions;
- organize an outing to a kids' club for the youngest residents;
- finish the renovation of the common room and hang new curtains;
- install eight modular homes on the shelter grounds, which can accommodate up to 40 people.

What's more, **MOTIVATION TO LIVE** has now received official status as a social services provider for people with disabilities and the elderly! This means they can now participate in social programs and apply for more grants. All of this was made possible thanks to your support.

# SUPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR INTERNALLY DISPLACED PEOPLE AND MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN IN KAMIANSKE (1,745)

The shelter in the city of Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk region, takes in internally displaced people and mothers with children facing difficult situations. About 35 people live there permanently.

Unfortunately, the shelter struggles with food supplies. Local farmers are not always able to send fruit and vegetables, and volunteer organizations can typically only provide grains. In October, we covered the cost of a month's worth of groceries for the shelter, so that its residents can eat healthy and tasty meals. We also sent funds to replace the linoleum in some of the rooms.

Pictured is Taras from Zaporizhzhia. He and his mother arrived at the shelter a year and a half ago. Taras suffered a head injury during a shelling attack and now lives with a disability. The shelter has become a second home for him, and your donations have provided him with a comfortable place to live.

# SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY (4,010)

Our Ukrainian partners evacuate civilians from frontline areas of Kharkiv Region, focusing on those who are most vulnerable — elderly, bedridden, or otherwise low-mobility people. After extraction they are placed in a specially equipped shelter where they receive daily care, as well as medical and psychological support. All of this is possible thanks to your donations.

Here's one evacuation story from Kupiansk.

Klavdiia Andriivna is 86. She lived alone and has no relatives. A shelling strike shattered every window and door in her house, leaving it uninhabitable. After that she agreed to evacuate. The situation was complicated by the fact that the same strike burned all of her documents. The shelter team is now helping her replace her passport and ID number. Once the paperwork is restored, staff will arrange for Klavdiia Andriivna to move in with a friend in Poltava—the only close person she has left.





# SUPPORT FOR THE MOTHER AND CHILD

CENTER €1,230

About 30 women live at the **MOTHER AND CHILD CENTER** in Sumy — many of them lost their homes to shelling or fled domestic violence. Most arrive with children and only a single bag of essentials.

For these women, the center becomes a temporary home where they can feel safe, receive support, regain their strength, and start over. The residents find not only shelter and care but genuine warmth, while the children get a chance to study, play, and return to a normal daily rhythm.

Thanks to your donations, we purchased new bedding for the shelter and devices so the children can attend online classes.

# EVACUATING PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS

£3,800

Another **LET'S HELP** partner works with Ukrainians who are trapped in occupied or frontline areas — or who have been deported to Russia. The team plans escape routes, prepares people for the journey, and accompanies them the whole way. They also help evacuees restore documents, find housing, and connect with doctors and psychologists.

Here's one evacuation story from Donetsk Region.

Nataliia (name changed) was living alone; all her relatives are on Ukraine-controlled territory. A neighbor dropped by now and then to help with chores, but Nataliia never left the house: she can move only indoors, leaning on a cane, and her eyesight is poor. Our partners bought her a wheelchair and found travel companions for the trip. She now lives with her daughter in Khmelnytskyi Region.

#### **EVACUATION FROM OCCUPIED TERRITORIES**



This month we again supported our partner organization that evacuates civilians from occupied areas. Its main goal is to secure safe passage to Ukraine-controlled territory or EU countries.

We cover transport, logistics, exit paperwork, and route coordination. Evacuees also receive food and medicine. With your help, the team will be able to bring about eight more people out of occupation.

# EQUIPPING A SCHOOL SHELTER IN ZAPORIZHZHIA (2,318)

Two evacuated schools now share the same building in the city of Zaporizhzhia; together they teach 245 students. In August we launched a fundraiser to turn the school's basement into a shelter for the children and for residents of the nearby apartment blocks.

Basic repairs are finished, but the space still needs desks, chairs, whiteboards, floor mats, and other items that will make it suitable for lessons. The plan also calls for resource zones where children with hearing or speech impairments can study alongside their classmates.

In August we sent the first tranche of donations, which the school used to buy desks and chairs for the shelter. In October we transferred a second tranche so the team could purchase the rest of the classroom equipment. The fundraiser for this safe learning space — for both children and local residents — continues.

#### **GROCERIES FOR THE ELDERLY FROM ORIKHIV**



In October we again supported a seniors' shelter in Zaporizhzhia Region by sending funds for groceries. The shelter is home to several dozen grandmothers and grandfathers from Orikhiv. They have no surviving family, and the war has taken their homes as well.

Most residents are over 80, and many suffer from serious illnesses, so a special diet is essential. Yet the shelter lacks the money to provide it. For a long time the elderly residents survived on canned food and milk made from powdered baby formula.

Your donations now give the Orikhiv seniors a tasty, varied diet that has been sustaining their health for more than six months.

The fundraiser is still open so these grandparents can keep eating well.

#### DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE (£5,000) AFFECTED BY SHELLING



In October our longtime partners—the Kharkiv-based foundation **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** — cooked and delivered:

- 2,300 hot lunches, 800 sandwiches, drinks, and sweets for evacuees in Kharkiv;
- 3,000 sandwiches, plus sweets and drinks, for other evacuees;
- 1,750 hot lunches for a shelter housing evacuees;
- 1,000 hot lunches, 9,000 sandwiches, sweets, and drinks for victims, first-responders, and volunteers at strike sites;
- 240 hot lunches, sandwiches, and water for low-mobility seniors in the Lypetska Hromada;
- 200 hot lunches for volunteers boarding up blown-out windows;
- 4,500 hot lunches for temporarily displaced children and children with limited mobility.

Your donations paid for a month's supply of food and disposable tableware, and covered the rent on the kitchen space where all this meals are prepared.

# VACCINES, CLAW TRIMMERS, AND SUPPLIES FOR THE KHARKIV PET SHELTER €3,030

Another longtime partner — the **KHARKIV CITY SHELTER** — took in 213 animals in October: 185 dogs and 28 cats. Shelter vets performed surgery and spay/neuter procedures on 123 of them, and 113 animals found new families or were transferred to rescue groups. The shelter now cares for 423 animals in total — 350 dogs and 73 cats. Thanks to your support this month, the shelter was able to buy vaccines, claw trimmers, and other supplies for daily care.

Pictured is a kitten named Nochka ("Little Night"). An unknown animal on the street attacked her and broke her tail. Shelter vets operated and are overseeing her recovery. Other Kharkiv-based partners of LET'S HELP — ANIMAL GUARDIANS UA — evacuate animals from combat zones,


treat them, and search for new homes. The foundation's shelter currently houses 138 cats and 14 dogs.

# LIUDMYLA AND VOLODYMYR'S FAMILY FROM

KAMIANSKE **£464** 

Liudmyla and her husband Volodymyr are pensioners from Avdiivka. Two years ago they had to flee the city with their 11-year-old grandson Kyrylo. Today the family rents a small flat in Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk Region.

Their pensions and the modest IDP allowance barely cover day-to-day expenses. The apartment they can afford needs at least basic repairs; it has no radiator or space heater, and Kyrylo, who studies online, has to walk to a classmate's place just to watch his lessons.

We sent the family funds for cosmetic repairs, an electric heater, a laptop for Kyrylo, warm clothing, groceries, and medicine. In addition, we have launched a fundraiser for portable power stations for them and other residents of Kamianske, so they can stay warm and connected even during shelling and power cuts.

### ALINA'S FAMILY FROM KAMIANSKE £610

Alina and her five-year-old son Artem left Avdiivka in 2023 and also settled in Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk Region. They live alone in a rented flat: Alina and her husband divorced before the full-scale war began, and he pays no child support. Alina earns a little as a manicurist; Artem attends kindergarten. The two receive only the minimum state allowance for low-income families. Their money barely covers rent and food, and Alina picks up toys and clothes for her son at the local church.

We sent the family funds to cover three months' rent and to buy an electric heater, clothing, a kettle, a thermos, and a power bank. In addition, we have launched a fundraiser for portable power stations for them and other residents of Kamianske, so they can stay warm and connected even during shelling and blackouts.

## TAMARA'S FAMILY FROM KAMIANSKE (£470)

Tamara left Druzhkivka in Kramatorsk District, Donetsk Region, in 2022 with her husband and two sons, aged 19 and 13. Tragically, her husband was killed in April, and the older son soon left for Poland to earn money. Tamara now lives with her younger son, Matvii, in a rented flat in Kamianske.

She works as a hairdresser, renting a chair in a salon, but constant power cuts keep interrupting her work. After recent shelling near their building, Matvii is afraid to stay home alone in the dark. Their apartment is barely furnished: it has only one bed, which Tamara and Matvii share.

We sent the family funds for a bed and other basic furniture to make life in their rented flat a bit more comfortable. We've also launched a fundraiser for portable power stations for Tamara, Matvii, and other residents of Kamianske, so they can stay warm and connected even during shelling and blackouts.

# OKSANA'S FAMILY FROM KAMIANSKE €720

Oksana and her two children are displaced for the second time. In 2015 they fled Makiivka, and in 2022 they had to leave Horiak. Oksana's daughter Veronika is 14, and her son Nikita just turned 12. The family now rents a flat in Kamianske.

Oksana earns a living as a manicure / pedicure specialist, while the children study in a mix of online and in-person classes. The household also includes two pets: Jessie the Chihuahua, who came with them from Horiak, and Alaska the cat, whom they adopted in Kamianske.

Because the children spend much of the day at home, they often cook for themselves. That job will now be safer and easier thanks to a multi-oven we funded for the family. We also helped them buy a laptop for schoolwork and covered three months' rent.

On top of that, we have launched a separate fundraiser for portable power stations for Oksana's family and other residents of Kamianske, so they can stay warm and connected even during shelling and blackouts.

# YEVHENIIA'S FAMILY FROM KAMIANSKE £570

Yevheniia and her relatives evacuated from Novohorodivka in 2024 and now share a rented flat in Kamianske with her retired mother and seven-year-old twin daughters, Daria and Kira. Yevheniia works as a secretary at an institute, and the girls attend a lyceum. One week they study in class, the next week online from their mother's phone, because the school's bomb shelter is too small to hold all the pupils during air-raid alerts.

We sent the family funds to buy winter clothing, a laptop for the girls' lessons, and a desk with chairs for their homework. We have also launched a separate fundraiser for portable power stations for this family and other residents of Kamianske, so they can stay warm and connected even during shelling and blackouts.

### TETIANA'S FAMILY FROM DNIPRO (2,000)

We featured Tetiana in an interview back in January. She had worked as a nurse in Kostiantynivka, caring for her severely wounded fiancé, Oleksandr, and later moved to Dnipro with her younger daughters to be with him.

On 9 September Tetiana's elder son, Yevhen — who was still living in Kostiantynivka with his wife, their little daughter, three German shepherds, and several cats — was badly wounded and taken to a hospital in Dnipro.

Both Yevhen's home in Kostiantynivka and Tetiana's own apartment were completely destroyed. We raised funds to cover rent, basic necessities, and pet food for both branches of the family.
