

DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING **€3,880**

In December, our longtime partners — the Kharkiv-based **ROKSANA AND THE TEAM** foundation — prepared and distributed:

- 6,555 hot meals, 10,000 sandwiches, drinks, and sweets for evacuees in Kharkiv;
- 2,500 sandwiches, drinks, and sweets for the evacuation headquarters in Kharkiv region;
- 1,200 hot meals for a shelter housing evacuees;
- 2,850 hot meals, 5,000 sandwiches, and drinks for those affected by strikes, rescuers, and volunteers at strike sites;
- 200 hot meals, 1,000 sandwiches, and water for elderly residents with limited mobility in Lyptsi hromada;
- 1,000 hot meals, 4,000 sandwiches, and drinks for volunteers boarding up windows after strikes;
- Around 4,000 hot meals for temporarily displaced and children with limited mobility.

Together, we helped the foundation purchase food and disposable tableware for a month, as well as pay rent for their cooking facility.

EVACUATING PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE AREAS

€3,800

20-year-old Maksym (name changed) from Zaporizhzhia region is deaf — he communicates only through sign language. Some time ago, his relatives died, and Maksym was left alone. After that, a friend submitted an evacuation request for the young man. Maksym had never left his hometown before, but he handled the journey very well. Now he is safe, surrounded by people who are helping him adapt to his new living conditions.

Maksym's evacuation was organized by our partners. The team facilitates the evacuation of Ukrainians from frontline and dangerous areas. The initiative works especially with those who find it particularly difficult to leave on their own: people with limited mobility and other physical or mental disabilities. Your donations make it possible to transport 12 people to safety each month.

SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH LIMITED MOBILITY **€3,010**

Mykola Petrovych is 83 years old. He lived in the village of Kovsharivka in Kharkiv region with his wife. In the first months of the full-scale war, he suffered a stroke but was able to recover. Soon after, his wife, who had been seriously ill for a long time, passed away.

Mykola Petrovych's home was partially destroyed by shelling, but he continued living there. He helped his neighbors repair their homes and, in the process, seriously injured his eye. He didn't receive medical care right away, so his vision in that eye could not be saved.

In the fall of 2024, shelling intensified, and Mykola Petrovych was evacuated. He arrived at our partners' shelter, where he received medical consultations and the necessary support. He then moved in with his nephew in Kharkiv and is now living with him.

Our partners' shelter takes in vulnerable people evacuated from dangerous areas. They receive medical and psychological support and are assisted with the next steps of their journey. Thanks to your donations, around 10 people receive this kind of help each month.




SUPPORT FOR A SHELTER FOR IDPs AND MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN IN KAMIANSKE

Inna lived in Dnipro. In January 2023, her building was struck. She wasn't injured, and her apartment is repairable, but what happened traumatized her deeply. Inna left Dnipro and is afraid to return home. She found shelter at our partners' facility in Kamianske, Dnipropetrovsk region.

This shelter takes in those who have nowhere else to go: people who lost their homes because of the war, and mothers with children who ended up on the street. Around 35 people live there permanently, and some more find temporary refuge there each month.

Unfortunately, the shelter can provide its residents with care and support, but not food — there isn't enough money for that. With your help, we bought a month's worth of groceries for the shelter. We also purchased irons, clothes dryers, and a TV for the children's room so kids can connect to their online classes more easily.

AID FOR AN IDP SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION

€5,340

Oleksandr and his wife Svitlana lived in the village of Malokaterynyvka in Zaporizhzhia region for 45 years. They had a large farm and their own business — a hat-making enterprise. The couple stayed in the village until the very end, even when their home was damaged by shelling. But the situation became critical, and they had to leave with only their documents. Svitlana and Oleksandr went to Zaporizhzhia, then to Dnipro, from where they ended up at our partners' shelter. Besides them, around 110 people live here. Another 20 find temporary refuge here each month.

In December, your donations helped the team:

- take in newly evacuated people, including those coming from hospitals and with injuries from strikes;
- renovate one of the shelter rooms and convert a garage into additional living space for temporary residents;
- organize a trip to the movies for the children;
- arrange for volunteers to come and teach evacuated people new professional skills;
- order specialized footwear for people with leg amputations and prosthetics;
- celebrate New Year's at the shelter.

DELIVERY OF PET FOOD TO UKRAINE

A shelter in Kryvyi Rih is home to 170 animals, including chronically ill animals and those with disabilities evacuated from de-occupied territories. The team cares for them and helps other city animals: they share food with Kryvyi Rih residents who have also taken in animals.

The shelter is supplied by partners of **LET'S HELP**— a volunteer initiative from Stockholm that buys food, medicine, and care supplies for Ukrainian cats and dogs. Let's Help covers the delivery of these supplies to Ukraine. In December, together we shipped 1,000 kg of pet food to Vinnytsia, Dnipropetrovsk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Mykolaiv, Odesa, and other regions of Ukraine.

TREATMENTS AND MEDICATIONS FOR ANIMALS AT THE KHARKIV SHELTER


The puppy in the photo ended up at our partners' shelter — the **KHARKIV CITY PET SHELTER** — thanks to soldiers returning from the combat zone who found a dog that had been hit on the Chuhuiv highway. Most likely, the puppy was simply abandoned — there are no settlements nearby, and a puppy could hardly have wandered that far. The puppy was found to have a fractured pelvic bone. Another clinic quoted a large sum for the surgery that the soldiers couldn't afford, so they reached out to our partners, who took on the animal's rescue for free. The puppy underwent surgery, is now under veterinary observation, and will soon be ready to go to a loving family.

In December, the **KHARKIV CITY PET SHELTER** took in 103 animals (66 dogs and 37 cats). Veterinarians sterilized 34 animals, and 65 animals found new homes or were taken in by public organizations. The shelter currently cares for 464 animals. Together, we helped the team purchase surgical supplies, vaccines, and veterinary medications.

FOOD, CAT LITTER, AND RENT FOR A SHELTER FOR EVACUATED PETS **€3,200**

A cat named Korzhyk arrived at our partners' shelter on December 30 from the combat zone near the city of Kupiansk. Soldiers evacuating their positions brought him along. The little one didn't stay at the shelter long — due to the large number of other cats and the confined space, he refused to eat and wouldn't move. Our partners decided to place Korzhyk in foster care with a family that had previously taken in another cat, Leia. The family grew so attached to the animal that they decided to keep him. Now the cat's name is Tsukatyk, and he's begun a new life surrounded by warmth and care.

But the foundation's shelter is still home to 136 cats and 13 dogs. With our help this month, the team was able to:

- purchase food, litter, and household supplies;
- pay rent, utilities, and the salary of a helper who cares for the animals;
- buy medicine and cover animal treatments.



СЕМЬЯ МАРИНЫ ИЗ ДНЕПРОПЕТРОВСКОЙ ОБЛАСТИ **€2,042**

49-year-old Maryna is a mother of two sons. Her younger son, 15-year-old Oleksii, has cerebral palsy and requires constant care. Her older son, 27-year-old Artem, has a permanent Category III disability, which prevents him from working. And Maryna's mother, 70-year-old Valentyna, suffers from arthritis in her knees and has limited mobility. Because of her younger son's condition, Maryna had to leave her job. She herself has serious health problems: she has no thyroid gland.

The family spent their entire lives in Lysychansk, Luhansk region, but were forced to leave on April 1, 2022. Their apartment is now occupied by invaders, and Maryna, along with her mother and Oleksii, live in a shelter in Dnipropetrovsk region.

We raised money for the family to buy medicine and diapers for Oleksii, a tablet for the boy's development and a wheelchair, as well as warm clothing, blankets, and a power bank, which the family needs to stay warm and connected during power outages.

NATALIA'S FAMILY FROM DNIPRO **€2,000**

On November 8, a Russian Shahed drone struck an apartment building in Dnipro. Three people were killed, 13 were injured, and apartments in an entire section of the building are now uninhabitable.

One of the survivors is Natalia, a tutor at a private school. Before her eyes, several floors collapsed, and neighbors from above fell into her living room. The woman, along with her husband, daughter, and dog, miraculously survived, but her second-floor apartment — the home where Nataliia had lived since birth — was completely destroyed. "It was my temple, my bones, my skin, my refuge," she says about her home.

We sent the family money for rent in a new place and to purchase essential items so they can begin rebuilding their lives.





TETIANA'S FAMILY FROM SHAKHTARSKE **€810**

Tetiana and her family — husband Yevhen and two daughters, ages 11 and 7 — were forced to leave their hometown of Myrnograd in Donetsk region in June 2024. They had their own apartment there, which they can no longer return to. The family now lives in the village of Shakhtarske in Dnipropetrovsk region. Yevhen, as he has all his life, works as a miner, while Tetiana stays home with the children, who continue their online schooling with their Myrnograd schools.

Their older daughter Katia connects to classes from a tablet the family received from school back in 2022. Its battery can no longer handle the regular power outages and the need to hold a charge for long periods. And their younger daughter, Liza, studies using her mother's phone.

We sent the family money to buy two laptops so the children can study comfortably. In addition, we helped buy clothing and shoes for the girls.

ALYONA'S FAMILY FROM CHERNIHIV

In December, Alyona, a single mother from Chernihiv, reached out to us for help again. Her husband died in July 2022. Since then, the woman has been raising her teenage son alone.

Her salary as an employee of the city water utility is barely enough to make ends meet, and the situation in the city only adds unplanned expenses: during one of the attacks, the windows in her home were blown out, and she had to urgently install new ones.

In December, we helped Alyona purchase groceries, clothing and shoes, medicine, and a power bank to stay connected during regular power outages.
