

WHY WE ARE PUBLISHING A REPORT FOR FOUR MONTHS AT ONCE

Before sharing who and how your donations have helped, we want to explain why **LET'S HELP** reports were not published for several months and why we are now reporting for May.

In May 2024, our account was blocked by a German bank. As it turned out, the reason was our transfer to Ukrainian citizen Anna Kotova, who was injured during the shelling of a residential building in Dnipro. We had shared Anna's story in the **HELPDESK.MEDIA** and were helping her as part of the **LET'S HELP** initiative.

Our attempts to unblock the existing account or open a new one in Germany were unsuccessful. Additionally, the payments we sent in May to charitable organizations in Ukraine were returned to our blocked account.

WHY WE ARE PUBLISHING A REPORT FOR FOUR MONTHS AT ONCE

June and July were challenging months, but we managed to transfer all the funds collected through **LET'S HELP** from the blocked account. Most importantly, we were able to send all the payments to our partners in Ukraine. Throughout this time, they continued their work: responding to the aftermath of attacks, housing people in shelters, delivering humanitarian aid to the most remote villages, rescuing animals — and they were eagerly awaiting our help.

By publishing this report, we want to announce that we have returned to our regular monthly schedule for payments and reports on the aid provided. Our help is still urgently needed: over the past months, **LET'S HELP** has gained new partners among Ukrainian NGOs, and people continue to come to us for support. We haven't given up, and we ask you to continue helping through **LET'S HELP** campaign those who have lost their homes, loved ones, and peaceful lives due to the war.

DELIVERY OF HOT MEALS TO PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SHELLING

€14,633

The volunteer group "Roksana and Team" from Kharkiv continues to provide meals for people in areas affected by shelling. Over the past few months, they have prepared and delivered more than 30,000 hot meals and over 50,000 sandwiches. The team is expanding the range of their assistance, now also supplying water and energy bars to volunteers who are clearing rubble and restoring damaged homes. Additionally, "Roksana and Team" provides food for evacuees from Pokrovsk, Myrnohrad, and other locations under attack by the Russian army, serving between 30 and 500 portions during each evacuation.

Your donations through "Let's Help" have helped cover the costs of renting a facility for meal preparation, purchasing ingredients, and delivering ready-made meals to those in need.



FOOD, EQUIPMENT, AND TREATMENT FOR AN ANIMAL SHELTER IN KHARKIV (14,231)

From May to September, the team at the "Animal Care Center" took in a steady influx of dogs and cats from across the Kharkiv region. During this time, the shelter welcomed 931 dogs and 266 cats. Caring for these animals was challenging, as the center frequently experienced power outages and communication disruptions due to shelling.

Many people seeking help are those who have evacuated from combat zones. Often, they have nowhere to leave their pets immediately after evacuation, as they can't take them to shelters and finding a rental apartment quickly isn't always feasible. The center takes care of such animals, providing temporary shelter and, in some cases, a permanent home.

Arisha the dog is one such case. She was rescued from the village of Shevchenkove in the Kharkiv region. Arisha has a spinal injury that affects her mobility. At the shelter, she is not only receiving medical treatment but has also been fitted with a specially designed wheelchair, allowing her to zoom around quickly in her own little vehicle.



EVACUATION OF PEOPLE WITH REDUCED MOBILITY FROM OCCUPIED AND FRONTLINE TERRITORIES €22,948

In May, the volunteer team successfully evacuated 27 people to safe territories. Among those evacuated were 14 people with limited mobility and 2 individuals who were completely immobile. The volunteers ensured their safe transportation and accommodated them in comfortable conditions, providing each person with the necessary assistance and support.

In July, volunteers facilitated the departure of another 11 people with limited mobility. In August, the team requested funding to evacuate 10 more individuals with limited mobility, as well as funds to purchase tickets within Ukraine for 70 people traveling through the Volyn humanitarian corridor.

SHELTER IN DNIPRO £41,739

The shelter provides assistance to people who have fled combat zones. For instance, in the spring, families with children from Krasnohorivka found temporary housing there.

In August, following the start of mandatory evacuation in the Pokrovsk district, the shelter team helped evacuate 120 individuals: 47 people over 60 years old, 65 individuals aged 18 to 59 (including 9 with disabilities and 4 with limited mobility), and 8 children. Those who could not be taken in by relatives stayed at the shelter.

In total, over the past few months, 467 people have passed through the shelter. They received medical and psychological support, as well as essential items (diapers, baby food, clothing). The shelter also assists with document restoration and ticket purchases to help individuals continue their journeys and reunite with family.



SHELTER IN THE DNIPROPETROVSK REGION



In May, renovations were completed in one of the shelter's rooms: mold was removed, lighting, locks, and flooring were replaced. As a result, the shelter was able to provide a roof over the heads of an additional 35 people.

Throughout the summer, the shelter hosted 126 transit residents from the Donetsk region. Many of them remain there, as they have nowhere else to go. Currently, 80 people reside in the shelter on a permanent basis.

As part of the **LETS'HELP** campaign, we not only assisted with paying the shelter rent (\in 3,560) but also covered operational needs (\in 2,625), food and water purchases (\in 4,880), clothing (\in 1,360), and medicines and hygiene products (\in 4,247). Additionally, we funded gas and fuel for generators (\in 2,589) and helped purchase bunk beds and a boiler (\in 930) to ensure there is always hot water in the home.



HUMANITARIAN AID FOR PEOPLE AND ANIMALS IN KHERSON AND MYKOLAIV 15,525

Mykolaiv Region: From May 13 to 16, volunteers delivered water and hygiene supplies to five villages in the Mykolaiv region. The main issues in these villages include a lack of drinking water, the absence of stores with essential goods, and poor road conditions following the occupation. Some areas of these villages are also mined.

Kherson: Volunteers provided water, food, and hygiene supplies to individuals with hearing impairments, as well as to the elderly and residents of the most dangerous areas of the city.

Mykolaiv City: On May 27, volunteers delivered food packages to displaced persons who lost their homes or reside in hazardous areas.

In total, volunteers distributed food packages and hygiene supplies to 800 residents, along with 1.2 tons of cat food and 2 tons of dog food.



SHELTER FOR PEOPLE WITH REDUCED MOBILITY FROM FRONTLINE AREAS (16,014)

When emergency evacuation was announced in the Kharkiv and Donetsk regions, many people with limited mobility remained at home under constant shelling. They require special conditions for evacuation: specialized transport and assistance.

A new partner of **LETS'HELP** has stepped in to provide support — a volunteer team dedicated to evacuating bedridden and mobility-impaired individuals and then placing them in a specially designed shelter. This facility is arranged to be comfortable and safe for those who struggle with movement, featuring ramps and medical beds. Residents receive basic care, medical and psychological support, while efforts are made to find them permanent housing.

Many individuals agree to evacuate only on the condition that their pets can accompany them. To address this need, the shelter has set up special enclosures to ensure that animals are also safe and can stay close to their owners. Since July, the shelter has welcomed 17 new residents.



DELIVERY OF TWO TONS OF ANIMAL FEED TO UKRAINE (2,493)

We support a volunteer organization in Sweden that collects food, medicines, and care supplies for cats and dogs in Ukraine. This assistance is aimed at animals from small private shelters and those living with local volunteers.

Thanks to your donations to **LET'S HELP**, over two tons of humanitarian aid have reached various cities in Ukraine from Sweden.




HELP PROVIDED MONTHLY

MEDICINES FOR UKRAINIAN REFUGEES IN GEORGIA €1,403

Since March 2022, the organization "Choose to Help" has been caring for Ukrainians who fled the war to Georgia. Every week, around 500 families seek assistance at their Tbilisi center. Here, they receive food, hygiene products, toys, school supplies, clothing, household items, and medicine at no cost.

We supported the organization by purchasing a basic supply of medicines for a month, which helped 555 families.






HELPING ON A ONE-TIME BASIS

SHELTER FOR ELDERLY PEOPLE IN KHARKIV (3,852)

In March 2022, a shelter was established for elderly and mobility-impaired individuals who were left alone after the onset of war and are unable to care for themselves due to age and health conditions. This shelter provides these individuals with a roof over their heads, food, and round-the-clock support from volunteers. Currently, over 50 people reside in the shelter, half of whom cannot move independently.

We assisted the shelter by glazing the terrace, creating a space where residents can spend time together, socialize, and find a moment of distraction from the horrors of war.



ASSISTANCE TO VICTIMS OF SHELLING AT "OKHMATDYT" HOSPITAL £25,028

On July 8, a Russian missile struck the main children's hospital in Kyiv —"Okhmatdyt", where critically ill children receive treatment. The attack resulted in the deaths of two people and injuries to 32 others, including eight children.

In response, we launched a dedicated fundraising campaign to assist those affected and successfully raised €25,000. The funds were transferred to the Ukrainian charity "Tabletochki", which collaborates with "Okhmatdyt" to support children undergoing treatment for cancer.

ASSISTANCE TO SCHOOLCHILDREN IN THE ZAPORIZHZHIA REGION £26,128

In August, we assisted 162 schoolchildren from the Zaporizhzhia region in preparing for the new academic year, while also helping 202 children return to inperson schooling. As a result of our fundraising campaign, together we:

- Collected backpacks filled with essential supplies and creative materials for 65 first-graders and 97 middle school students.
- Funded the transformation of a basement in a lyceum into safe and cozy classrooms, enabling 202 children to continue their education during alerts and shelling.

Before the school year began, our partners from the "Vilna UA" foundation organized a celebration for the students and presented them with their backpacks.



SERHII FROM MARIUPOL 66,365

In the spring of 2022, Serhii witnessed the tragic loss of nearly his entire family: two daughters, his ex-wife, and his mother. The only survivor is his son, Arthur, who suffered spinal injuries from shrapnel. Arthur is currently undergoing treatment in Germany, facing a difficult rehabilitation process and the pain of being separated from his father.

We assisted Serhii in covering the costs of his trip to visit his son in Germany, as well as providing funds for erecting memorials for his deceased family members.



HELPING ON A ONE-TIME BASIS

KARYNA'S FAMILY FROM KHARKIV (1/1/32)

Karyna and her parents' homes were completely destroyed in the shelling. Currently, she lives in a rented apartment in Uzhhorod with her son, while her parents are in a village near Kharkiv. Karyna works as a children's coach, and her salary barely covers the needs of her and her child, let alone providing assistance to her parents.

We are helping her with rent payments, utility bills, and other daily necessities.





SVITLANA FROM KHERSON £907

On August 8, 2024, Svitlana's apartment was severely damaged during the shelling of Kherson, rendering her home uninhabitable and destroying almost all of her belongings. Now, Svitlana is trying to rebuild her life from scratch in Odesa. This is not easy for her, as she needs to buy everything from bed linens to kitchen utensils and clothing.

We assisted Svitlana by covering her rent and helping her purchase essential items.

ALYONA'S FAMILY FROM IZIUM £559

Alyona is a single mother from Izium. The apartment where she lived with her two daughters suffered significant damage during shelling in March 2022. Windows were shattered, and shrapnel damaged the walls and ceiling. After the deoccupation, the apartment became uninhabitable due to high humidity and mold.

Alyona and her daughters are working on restoring their home themselves. We assisted them in completing cosmetic repairs: replastering the walls, applying new wallpaper, and fixing the ceiling. Additionally, we helped them purchase a stove, new dressers, and a desk for the girls.





PAYMENT ORDER No1, No2

NATALIA FROM KHARKIV (£303)

Natalia from Kharkiv has been rescuing, treating, and rehoming cats and dogs for over 15 years. All her animals are strays, many rescued from the most heavily shelled areas of the city or evacuated from frontline territories. Currently, Natalia cares for 36 cats and 2 dogs.

We assisted her in purchasing food and medications for the animals.



ELEONORA FROM KHARKIV

Eleonora's family, which includes her grandmother and grandfather, lost both of their homes due to the war. Their apartment in Kharkiv was destroyed during a shelling, and returning to Lysychansk is impossible since the city was occupied by Russia in 2022. Eleonora and her spouse moved to Germany, and we assisted them with purchasing essential items.
